Some of the reasons against this are as follows: One of the disadvantages is it will cost money to build a new Town Hall. Presently it doesn't appear that the atmosphere in the State and County government is such that rapid growth in the Western New York area is probable. We must tighten our belts. It was noted by Supervisor Sedovy that New York State taxes are greater than any state in the Union, both on a per capita and assessed valuation basis. Supervisor Sedovy recommended that it should be fully explored by a qualified structural engineer to see what can be done with the present building to meet minimum standards, to explore if this building is near the end of life and if not what it would cost to be put in shape. Justice Stromecki asked that they hold back a little, and be conservative. He stated he was not in favor of a new building at this time. Supervisor Sedovy stated that he had not committed himself on a new Town Hall. I have always maintained a course of action with the need to fully justify the cost and savings which would result from one of two courses of action; building a new Town Hall versus the cost and savings of renovating the present building and making it acceptable. Justice Tills stated that he feels that the Town of Boston needs a central core, a place where the people of the Town can meet as a group. Justice Tills asked that not just how the taxes will be raised, but also how much of a savings there will be if it is built now and not 5 years from now. He asked that they look at all factors, consider them and then make a decision. 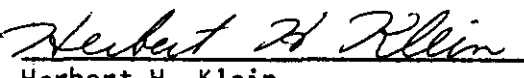

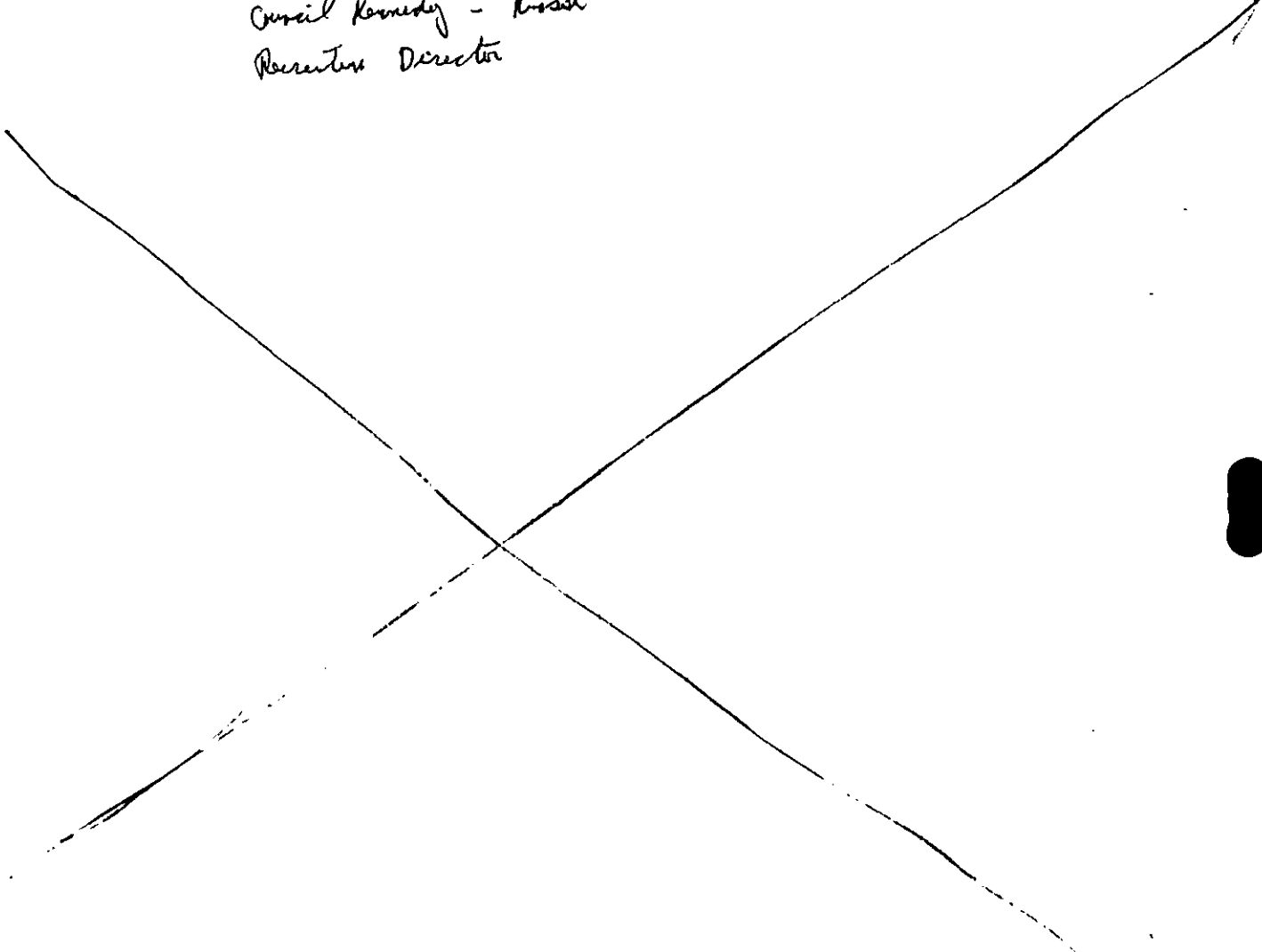

WHEREAS, taxpayers in the Town of Boston, as property owners in small water districts and extensions and sanitary sewer districts and extensions may be liable to pay the cost of removal or relocation of water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities and appurtenances that are maintained for public use within the right-of-way of any County road where such County road has been relocated or improved within the Town of Boston, and

WHEREAS, such costs certainly in the future will become oppressive to the individual taxpayer so situated, and

WHEREAS, the improvement of County roads within the Town of Boston represents a benefit to all of the residents of Erie County and should equitably be borne by all of the taxpayers of Erie County as users of the County road network, and

WHEREAS, the State Department of Transportation has adopted a policy, authorized by Section 10 (24) of the Highway Law of the State of New York, paying for such relocation of municipal utilities within State rights-of-way or State improvement or relocation projects, and

WHEREAS, it appears from legal research that under the present status of the Law under Section 136 of the Highway Law, the County of Erie may not have the legal right to assume the cost of such utility relocation or removal on its County road projects, and

WHEREAS, under the present status of the law, in the original permit to place water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities and appurtenances by water and sewer districts in the County road rights-of-way, every Town and Village in Erie County must submit a permit application to the County Department of

Public Works under said Section 136 of the Highway Law, which permit is conditioned in Paragraph 2 thereof as follows:

"Any cost involved in the removal or relocation of installations made overhead, on the surface or underground as a result of this permit, due to highway reconstruction or maintenance work, shall be borne by the owner. Driveways may be excepted at the County's option."

and,

WHEREAS, the County of Erie should equitably and morally assume the costs of such removal or relocation of water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities and appurtenances thereto maintained in the County rights-of-way as a general cost of the County road improvement, and

WHEREAS, Chapter 969 of the Laws of 1969 authorizes Monroe County to pay a portion or all of expenses for the removal or relocation of water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities and appurtenances thereto maintained for public use within the rights-of-way or any County road where the County Superintendent of Highways deems such County road necessary to be repaired, constructed, reconstructed or relocated,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, as follows:

Section 1. That the Town Board of the Town of Boston petition Arthur J. Carlson, 18th District County Legislator, the County Legislature, the County Executive and the Commissioner of Public Works of the County of Erie, in accordance with this resolution, to endorse the concept that the County of Erie shall pay all expenses for the removal or relocation of any water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities and appurtenances thereto that are maintained for public use within the rights-of-way of any County road where the County Commissioner of Public Works for Highways deems such County road necessary to be repaired, constructed, reconstructed or relocated in the public interest and urge enactment of legislation by the State Legislature in the

same general nature as Chapter 969 of the Laws of 1969, which authorized and empowered Monroe County to pay for such costs.

Section 2. That the Town Attorney be and hereby is authorized and directed to contact Ronald H. Tills, 147th District Assemblyman, Frank Walkey, 148th District Assemblyman, and Thomas F. McGowan, 54th District Senator, to introduce and seek enactment of legislation authorizing Erie County to pay for removal and/or relocation of water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities and appurtenances thereto within rights-of-way of County roads in the County of Erie, based upon an act of the Legislature known as Chapter 969 of the Laws of 1969, which authorized such costs to be paid by the County of Monroe.

Section 3. That every Town and Village in Erie County be strongly urged to adopt a resolution similar to this resolution and that the official body of each such municipality be urged to contact the County Executive and County Legislature and each Assemblyman and State Senator in their particular district, urging enactment of the foregoing enabling legislation.

Section 4. That the Town Clerk be and hereby is directed to forward a certified copy of this resolution, and a copy of Chapter 969 of the Laws of 1969, to each municipal body of every Town and Village in Erie County, with a request that action be taken by their respective municipal board in furtherance of the aims of this resolution.

CHAPTER 969 - LAWS OF 1969

Monroe County - Water Mains, Etc. - Removal - Relocation - Payment

An Act authorizing the county of Monroe to pay for removal and/or relocation of water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities within rights-of-way of county roads in county of Monroe.

Approved and effective May 26, 1969.

Section 1. Notwithstanding any general, special or local law or charter provision to the contrary, the county legislature of the county of Monroe, upon recommendation of the county manager, may provide that the county shall pay a portion of or all expenses for the removal or relocation of any water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities and appurtenances thereto that are maintained for public use within the right-of-way of any county road and where the county superintendent of highways deems such county road necessary to be repaired, constructed, reconstructed or relocated in the interest of public health and safety. Ownership of these facilities shall be restricted to cities, towns, villages in Monroe county or publicly owned authorities or town or county improvement districts. The provisions of this act shall not apply to payment of expenses for removal of such facilities that are owned by private utility corporations.

The Monroe county superintendent of highways shall notify the owner or owners of facilities to be removed or relocated and request them to prepare the necessary plans and specifications, which shall be subject to his approval. The county manager, on behalf of the county, may contract for the removal or relocation of the facilities as a part of the county road highway construction contract. Such action however must be preceded by county receipt of a written resolution of consent from the owner or owners of the facilities. However, the removal of the facilities may be made by the owner of the facility with its own equipment and personnel or pursuant to contract entered into by the owner of the facility with other individuals, firms, companies or corporations. Whichever method is followed, all plans and specifications for the work must be approved by the Monroe county superintendent of highways together with costs of said work, in order to assure conformance with the county's road project and to determine the amount of cost to the county. Reimbursement by the county of Monroe for advances in the course of the work shall be made by the county superintendent of highways upon examination and audit of construction and cost records. The county superintendent of highways shall have the right to inspect all work or removal or relocation of the facilities.

The expense to the county of such removal and/or relocation of water mains, sewer lines or similar facilities and appurtenances thereto, as provided herein, shall be a proper charge against funds available for the repair, construction, reconstruction or relocation of county roads within Monroe county.

The County of Monroe and cities, towns, villages, publicly owned authorities and town or county improvement districts which operate within the scope of the provisions of this act are hereby authorized to enter into contract for the stated purposes and in accordance with this legislation.

The expenditure of moneys by the county for Monroe for any project undertaken by the county, pursuant to the provisions of this act, shall be deemed a lawful county purpose.

The maintenance of the facilities after relocation shall be the responsibility of the owner or owners thereof.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Town Board of the Town of Boston,
Erie County, New York memorializes all Western New York State Assemblymen
and Senators to do everything possible to insure passage of the Tills

3. Submit plans and studies of renovating the present Town Hall vs a new Town Hall to a referendum.

Justice Tills agreed with Supervisor Sedovy's presentation and added that it scares him that we are meeting in a room that is not safe and that there are baby clinics in the basement where the furnace is not safe. He also pointed out that we require new buildings to comply with the State Building Code, but our Town Hall does not and feels that a new Town Hall would serve as a central location for groups to meet. Justice Stromecki agreed with the Supervisor's summerization.

Councilman Kennedy feels that the costs will continue to rise and that we should plan for a new Town Hall. Councilman Schunk favored a new Town Hall rather than spending \$42,000 to renovate the present Town Hall. Supervisor Sedovy asked the Board's co-operation in making a study of cost-tax and benefits of a new Town Hall and renovating the present Town Hall. Councilman Schunk noted that if an architect was hired and then the people voted in November against a new Town Hall that the architect's fee would be wasted. Mr. Decker, a member of the Capital Improvements Committee stated that the architect would have to work with the Town on the preliminary plans at no extra cost for an indefinite period. Councilman Kennedy felt that in order to put a referendum to the people there should be accurate figures. The Capital Improvements Committee recommended that an architect be hired. A motion was made by Justice Tills and seconded by Councilman Kennedy that we accept the report of the Capital Improvements Committee and hire an architect to spend up to \$5,000 for preliminary plans and direct that the Capital Improvements Committee work with the architect and report back to us as to the progress and in addition continue studying the advantages of a new Town Hall with the understanding that such information will then be made available to the voters prior to the referendum where the question of a new Town Hall will be submitted to the voters of the Town for approval.

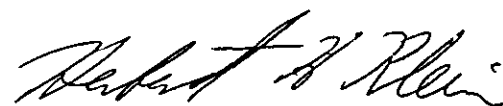

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Town Board of the Town of Boston will hold a Public Hearing on the 12th day of April, 1972, at 8:00 P.M., Eastern Standard Time, in the Town Hall of the Town of Boston, Boston State Road, Boston, New York, to consider the adoption of an ordinance pertaining to the requirement for the approval of subdivisions in the Town of Boston, as follows:

An Ordinance Regulating the approval of land subdivision for the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York.

ARTICLE I
AUTHORITY

By the authority of a prior resolution adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Boston on the 7th day of May 1958, and the adoption of this ordinance pursuant to the provisions of Article 16 of the Town Law, the Planning Board of the Town of Boston is empowered and authorized to study and to approve or disapprove in accordance with the procedures and regulations of this ordinance plats for land subdivisions within the Town of Boston.

ARTICLE II
DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of these regulations, certain words used herein are defined as follows:

Master Plan—A comprehensive plan prepared by the Planning Board pursuant to Section 272-a of the Town Law which indicates the general locations recommended for the various functional classes of public works, places and structures and for the general physical development of the Town, and includes any unit or part of such plan separately adopted and any amendment to such plan or part thereof.

Planning Board or Board—The Town Planning Board.

Preliminary Subdivision Plat—The preliminary drawings indicating the proposed layout of the subdivision to be submitted to the Planning Board for its consideration.

Final Subdivision Plat—The final drawings on which the subdivider's plan of subdivision is presented to the Planning Board for approval and which, if approved, may be filed for record with the County Clerk.

Sketch Plan—A sketch of the proposed subdivision showing information specified in Article V, Section 1 of these regulations to enable the subdivider to save time and expense in reaching general agreement with the Planning Board as to the form of the subdivision and objectives and requirements of these regulations.

Street—Any road, highway, avenue, street, parkway, lane or other way between right-of-way lines, commonly used by the public for street purposes.

Subdivision—The division of any parcel of land in five or more lots, plots, sites or other division of land for immediate or future sale of building development.

Town—The Town of Boston in the County of Erie and State of New York.

Town Board—The Board of the Town of Boston.

Superintendent—The Superintendent of Highways of the Town.

Building Inspector—The duly designated building inspector of the Town.

Town Engineer—The duly designated engineer or engineering consultant of the Town.

Town Attorney—The duly designated Attorney of the Town.

Zoning Ordinance—The Zoning Ordinance of the Town.

Town Law—The Town Law of the State of New York.

ARTICLE III
RULES AND REGULATIONS
WITH RESPECT TO PROCEDURE BEFORE THE PLANNING BOARD.

SECTION 1.

General Requirements—Any matters over which the planning board has jurisdiction shall be brought before the Planning Board by written application pursuant to the following general requirements:

A. The Board may adopt such application forms as it deems necessary and make such amendments to such forms as are required from time to time.

LEGAL NOTICE

B. The application forms when completed shall be submitted pursuant to instructions contained therein with such other papers, documents, memoranda statutes and/or these regulations.

C. All application forms must be executed by the applicant in writing and if the owner of the land to be subdivided is not the applicant, then same must be accompanied by the written consent of the owner to the application.

D. All applications must be submitted to the Planning Board at least ten days prior to the regular meeting of the Board at which said application is to be considered.

SECTION 2.

Specific requirements of Preliminary Subdivision Application—The following papers and documents shall be submitted in connection with the request for preliminary approval of subdivisions in addition to the written application form and consent required in Section 1-C of Article III.

A. Three copies of Survey of the property to be subdivided prepared by a licensed Surveyor of the State of New York.

B. Three copies of Preliminary Subdivision Plat of the proposed subdivision noting thereon dimensions of roads, dimensions of lots, area of each lot, showing frontage and depth, adjoining public highways, and names of owners of adjoining property. The preliminary plat shall be accompanied by a vicinity map drawn at the scale of 1,000 feet to the inch showing the relation of the proposed subdivision to the adjacent properties and to the general surrounding area and highways.

C. Three copies of a topographical map prepared by a licensed surveyor of the State of New York, showing detailed elevation of the land to be subdivision.

SECTION 3.

Procedure Upon Submission of Preliminary Subdivision Plat—Following a review of the preliminary and other documentation submitted as herein required, the planning board shall study the practicality of the preliminary plat with particular attention to the arrangement, location and width of streets, their relation to the topography of the land, water supply, drainage, sewer disposal and the future development of adjoining lands, subdivided or unsubdivided and the requirements of the master plan, zoning regulations and official map of the Town, if such exists. The Planning Board based on the submissions and the considerations herein stated shall negotiate with the subdivider on changes deemed advisable and the kind and extent of improvements to be made by him in accordance with the requirement of these subdivision regulations.

No later than ten days from the submission of the preliminary plat together with other documentation required at the time of said submission, same shall also be submitted by applicant to the Superintendent of Highways in the Town of Boston.

SECTION 4.

Conditional Approval of the Preliminary Plat—Within 45 days after original submission of the preliminary plat and other documentation required herein, the Planning Board shall either conditionally approve said plat with modifications specified in writing or disapprove said plat stating in writing the reasons for said disapproval. The action of the Board relating to approval, conditional approval or a rejection of the preliminary plat shall be noted in writing on three copies of said plat to which shall be attached reference statements of any conditions and requirements determined by the Board in accordance with these regulations and one copy shall be returned to the subdivider, and one copy shall be filed with the Town Clerk. It is further understood and agreed that conditional approval of the preliminary layout shall not constitute approval of the final subdivision plat, but rather it shall be deemed an expression of approval to the layout submitted in preliminary form as a guide to the preparation of the final subdivision plat.

SECTION 5.

Procedure for Final Approval of Plat.

A. The subdivider shall within

two years after approval of the Preliminary plat by the Planning Board file with the Planning Board written application for approval of the final subdivision plat, on written application forms as determined by the Planning Board accompanied by a fee payable by check to the Town of Boston amounting to \$25.00 for each subdivision lot contained within the final subdivision map upon which approval is requested. Conditional approval of the preliminary plat shall expire two years after such approval unless extended by separate resolution of the Town Board.

B. Application for approval of the final subdivision plat shall be submitted in writing as hereinbefore required to the Planning Board at least ten days prior to the regular meeting of the Planning Board at which it is to be considered and shall include six copies of the plat fully documented as required by these regulations and other exhibits required for approval as specified herein.

C. Approval of Erie County Health Department—No final plat for subdivision approval shall be submitted by the applicant or accepted by the Planning Board for final approval unless there is concurrently submitted approval in writing by the Erie County Health Department of sewerage disposal facilities or when required by the New York State Department of Public Health.

D. At the time of the submission of the final plat for subdivision, in addition to the documentation required, the subdivider shall file with the Planning Board the written consent of the approval of said plat executed by the Superintendent of Highways of the Town of Boston.

E. Before the Planning Board shall approve a final plat and within 90 days of submission for final approval, it shall hold a public hearing which shall be advertised in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town of Boston, at least five (5) days before such hearing. Thereafter, and within 45 days from the date of the public hearing the Planning Board shall approve, or disapprove said plat.

SECTION 6.

Design standards of subdivision plats.

A. Preservation of Natural Features—The Planning Board shall, wherever possible, establish the preservation of all natural features which add value to residential developments and to the community, such as large trees or groves, water courses and falls, historic spots, vistas and similar irreplaceable assets.

B. Streets:

(1) The arrangement, character, extent, width, grade, and location of all streets shall conform to the Official Map and the Master Plan and shall be considered in their relation to existing and planned streets, to topographical conditions, to public convenience and safety, and in their appropriate relation to the proposed uses of the land to be served by such streets, by the Planning Board and Town Superintendent of Highways.

(2) Where such is not shown in the Official Map or Master Plan, the arrangement of streets in a subdivision shall either:

(a) Provide for the continuation or appropriate projection of existing principal streets in surrounding areas; or

(b) Conform to a plan for the neighborhood approved or adopted by the Planning Board to meet a particular situation where topographical or other conditions make continuance or conformance to existing streets impracticable.

(3) Minor streets shall be so laid out that their use by through traffic will be discouraged.

(4) Where a subdivision abuts or contains an existing or proposed arterial street, the Planning Board may require marginal access, reverse frontage with screen planting contained in a non-access reservation along the rear property line, deep lots with rear service alleys, or such other treatment as may be necessary for adequate protection of residential properties and to afford separation of through and local traffic.

(5) Where a subdivision borders on or contains a railroad right-of-way or limited access highway right-of-way, the planning board may require a street approximately

LEGAL NOTICE

parallel to and on each side of such right-of-way, at a distance suitable for the appropriate use of the intervening land, as for part purposes in Residential Districts, or for commercial or industrial purposes in appropriate districts. Such distance shall also be determined with due regard for the requirements of approach grades and future grade separations.

(6) Reserve strips controlling access to streets shall be prohibited except where their control is definitely placed in the Town under conditions approved by the Planning Board.

(7) Streets jogs of intersecting streets with centerline offsets of less than one hundred twenty-five (125) feet, shall be avoided.

(8) A tangent at least one hundred (100) feet long shall be introduced between reverse curves on arterial and collector streets.

(9) When contiguous street centerline tangents deflect from each other at any one point by more than ten (10) degrees, they shall be connected by a curve with a radius adequate to insure a sight distance of not less than three hundred (300) feet for minor streets, and of such greater radii as the Planning Board shall determine for other types of streets.

(10) Streets shall be laid out so as to intersect as nearly as possible at right angles and no street shall intersect any other street at less than seventy-five (75) degrees.

(11) Property lines at street intersections shall be rounded with a radius of ten (10) feet, or of a greater radius where the Planning Board may deem it necessary. The Planning Board may permit comparable cut-offs or chords in place of rounded corners.

(12) Street right-of-way widths shall be as shown on the Official Map or Master Plan and where not shown therein shall be not less than six (6) feet or such greater width as may from time to time be established by Highway Specifications adopted by the Town Board and which are attached hereto as "Schedule A" for reference only.

(13) Half streets shall be prohibited, except where essential to the reasonable development of the subdivision in conformity with the other requirements of these regulations; and where the Planning Board finds it will be practicable to require the dedication of the other half street is adjacent to a tract to be subdivided, the other half of the street shall be platted within such tract.

(14) Dead-end streets, designed to be so permanently should wherever possible be not longer than four hundred (400) feet and shall be provided at the closed end with a turn-around having an outside roadway diameter of at least one hundred (100) feet, and a street property line diameter of at least one hundred fifty (150) feet. All turn-arounds or cul-de-sacs shall be designed to be completely paved so that there is no island in the middle of the circle and so that the pavement drains from the middle of the circle to outside edges.

(15) Street improvements shall be provided continuously from the existing improved street system up to and along the entire frontage of each lot upon which a dwelling is to be built. For corner lots, all street improvements shall be provided on the side streets to the rear lot line of each corner lot upon which a dwelling is to be built.

(16) No street names, should where possible, be used which will duplicate or be confused with the names of existing streets. Streets names shall be subject to the approval of the Town Board.

(17) No street grade shall exceed 10% and within fifty (50) feet of any intersecting highway not more than 3% grades shall be permitted.

(18) No trees shall be planted within the street right-of-way.

B. Easements to the Town of Boston

(1) Easements across lots or centered on rear or side lot lines shall be provided for utilities where deemed necessary by the Planning Board, and shall be of a width deemed necessary by the Planning Board. Easements shall be provided for surface drainage where required by the Planning Board. All easements shall be at least twenty (20) feet in width.

(2) Where a subdivision is traversed by a water course,

LEGAL NOTICE

drainage way, channel or stream, there shall be provided a storm water easement of at least twenty (20) feet in width, or drainage right-of-way conforming substantially with the lines of such water course, including its side banks and such further width or construction, or both, as will be adequate for the purpose of maintenance. Parallel streets or roads may be required in connection therewith for access.

(3) Where storm sewers or ditches may be required, to discharge across adjacent property in order to drain into a natural watercourse of the watershed in which the subdivision lies, the subdivider, shall secure an easement from the adjacent property owners to assure uninterrupted discharge of drainage water from the subdivision.

ARTICLE IV

SECTION 1.

Monuments—Monuments shall be placed at least at four (4) subdivision corners and at such intermediate points as would separately be required by the Town Engineer. The monuments shall be of such material size and length as may be proved by the Town Engineer.

SECTION 2.

Highway, Utility and Street Improvements—Notwithstanding anything herein contained, all highways, public utilities and drainage easements to be installed shall be done at the sole expense and costs of the subdivider and in accordance with these rules and regulations as determined by the Town Board of the Town of Boston, by resolution thereof, now existing and as hereafter may be modified from time to time by the Town Board of the Town of Boston.

ARTICLE V

SECTION 1.

Submission of Sketch Plan—Nothing herein contained shall preclude an owner or subdivider from requesting an informal meeting with the Planning Board for the purpose of presenting a Sketch map or plan of a proposed subdivision which map shall show proposed layout of streets, lots and other features shown on a print or survey of the property.

ARTICLE VI

SECTION 1.

Building Permits—No building permits shall be issued for the construction of residential homes on subdivision roads unless a true copy of the final map cover, as filed in the Erie County Clerk's office shall have been previously filed with the Planning Board and the Town Clerk and unless all improvements for highway, water and public sewer or storm drainage (where required), utilities have been installed and accepted by the Town of Boston or a Performance and Maintenance Bond (one year) filed and accepted by the Town, and in amounts and form acceptable to the Town of Boston in accordance with Section 280-A of the Town Law. In lieu of bonds, cash, collateral or other security as approved by the Town Attorney must be accepted.

ARTICLE VII

VARIANCES

SECTION 1.

Where the Board finds that because of unusual circumstances of the shape, topography or other physical features of the subdivision tract or because of the nature of adjacent developments that extraordinary hardship may result from strict compliance with regulations, it may vary the regulations so that substantial justice may be done and the public interest secured, provided, however, that no such variation shall be granted which will have the effect of nullifying the intent and purposes of the Erie County Sanitary Code of these regulations.

SECTION 2.

Cluster-Type Subdivision—At its discretion the Planning Board is hereby empowered to approve cluster-type subdivisions and vary or diminish individual lot areas or frontage, as required by the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Boston, provided the entire area contained within the subdivision meets the cumulative density requirements of the zoning ordinance as now existing or hereafter amended. Public road areas shall not be used in calculating the existing density requirements of the tract.

ARTICLE VIII SECTION 1.

Engineering Fees and Expense-
At the time of submission of the subdivision map for approval the subdivider shall agree in writing or on the application form for submission to reimburse the Town of Boston for any expense incurred for the inspection by the Town Engineer for the installation of water lines, sewer lines and facilities or storm sewer improvements, all of which shall be inspected as to workmanship and material specification prior to acceptance by the Town of Boston. The failure to promptly pay such expense shall be grounds for immediate suspension of all building permits.

ARTICLE IX SECTION 1.

Enforcement of Regulations--A
violation of these regulations is an offense punishable by a fine not exceeding fifty (50) dollars. Each day's continued violation shall constitute a separate additional violation.

ARTICLE X SECTION 1.

Filing of Subdivision Map--The
final plot as approved and so stamped by the Planning Board must be filed or recorded in the Erie County Clerk's Office within sixty (60) days of such written approval.

WHEREAS, the establishment of a County Board of Assessment Review would frustrate local efforts and local expertise in dealing with assessment review problems at the local level and, once again, seriously curtail local Home Rule and the administration of local governmental matters, and

WHEREAS, a County Board of Assessment Review would be a duplication of efforts, eroding the confidence of the general public in the ability of local government to exercise its governmental function and will also add materially to the cost of governmental services,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Boston memorialize the Erie County Legislature in the following manner:

1. That this Body opposes Local Law No. 28, 1971, entitled
"A Local Law to amend the Erie County Charter, in relation
to the establishment of a Board of Assessment Review to

The Town Attorney and Town Clerk were directed to write a letter to those on the list in order to collect on the bills. The Town is under obligation to pay what cannot be collected.

A report was given by the Town Clerk in regard to the Liability Insurance for the Rescue Squad from the State Insurance Fund. It was noted that after letters had been written by the Town Clerk and Al Dye, the Agent, that the amount of payroll had been substantially reduced resulting in a savings on the Premium of more than \$1,000.00.

A motion was made by Justice Tills and seconded by Councilman Kennedy to approve an Occupancy permit for Emerling Chevrolet as a letter had been received from the Erie County Health Department approving the construction of the Septic system and James Pfanner reported the building had been completed according to the permit.

Town Attorney Maxwell reported that the next step in acquiring approval of the application for Water District #2 is adoption of an order which shall include the boundaries of the District. Supervisor Sedovy reported that the map plan showing the boundaries, general plan and proposed method of operation of the District as prepared by Town Engineer Moncreiff, was on file in the Town Clerk's Office. The matter of the proceeding of Water District #2 under Article 12A of the Town Law was tabled for a Special Meeting to be held on Friday, October 20, 1972, at 5:15 P. M. at the Town Hall.

Mr. James Jehle, Boston Historian requested the Town Board to look into the possibility of restoring an old cemetery on Feddick Road. Supervisor Sedovy appointed Mr. Jehle chairman of this project and directed the Town Clerk to write a letter informing Mr. Jehle of this and also to advise him that Town Attorney Maxwell is willing to assist him with any legal problems he might have.

It was reported by Supervisor Sedovy that a meeting had been hold on October 10, 1972, concerning Sewer District #4. Present at the meeting were Town Attorney Maxwell, Town Engineer Moncreiff, Mr. Weller, Representatives of the State and County Health Department. Mr. Weller was asked at this meeting to take care of the jobs necessary to complete Sewer District #4. The Town taking over this Sewer District will be discussed at the November 9, 1972, Town Board meeting.

A motion was made by Justice Tills and seconded by Councilman Kennedy appointing Jacqueline Knox as a temporary Election Inspector for registration days only to replace Patricia Stutzman in District #2.

Supervisor Sedovy reported that the Town of Boston is now increasing in Assessed valuation after a 4 year period of slow growth. In 1971 the pace picked up and with the Southern Expressway now a reality it seems people will want to develop. Sewers will hopefully be a reality in the future. The economy is growing and this will contribute to a more rapid growth. Supervisor Sedovy stated that he felt this was the time to review the Town of Boston's Zoning regulations and bring them up to date. He felt the present Zoning regulations were archaic and appointed a Committee of Town Clerk Herbert Klein, Chairman, Building Inspector James Pfaner, Justice Leo Stromecki and Town Attorney Maxwell. The purpose of this committee will be to look into the updating of the present ordinance and Supervisor Sedovy suggested that this committee check with other towns who have good Zoning Ordinances.

Town Clerk Herbert Klein reported that it cost the people of the Town of Boston \$7,727.75 to have their School Taxes collected. It is a State Law that a second class Town does not have the authority to appoint their collector to collect School Taxes, but rather the State law designates this authority to the School Board. It was noted that the Town Clerk has worked diligently to have this law repealed.

Highway Superintendent Luno reported on a Highway Safety meeting that he recently attended. He noted that the Town of Boston would be able to get Highway signs free or at a nominal fee if applied for by November 10, 1972. Highway Superintendent Luno, Justice Stromecki and Police Chief Cartwright will go out to check on what signs are needed.

Highway Superintendent Luno stated that he would like to bring into the open the rumors in Town regarding the improper use of Highway equipment. Mr. Luno stated that he requested Supervisor Sedovy to investigate this matter. Supervisor Sedovy reported that this matter concerned the Town Highway roller being used in rolling stone for surfacing of the highway in the Park Lane Sub-division. Mr. Sedovy reported as the Town does not have a bulldozer, that the Highway Department exchanged services with Robert Smolinski, a private contractor in the Town of Boston. The exchange consisted of Mr. Smolinski using the Town Highway roller and the Town Highway Department using the bulldozing services of Mr. Smolinski. Supervisor Sedovy stated that he expected this was done for the purpose of saving the Town money. Supervisor Sedovy stated that he had asked the Town Attorney to research whether it was permissible to use Town Highway equipment, in renting of same or the trading of same with private individuals.

Supervisor Sedovy stated that Mr. Maxwell's report to him was as follows: Article VIII, Section 1, of the New York State Constitution states: "No County, city, Town, Village or School District shall give or loan the money or property to or in aid of any individual, or private corporation or association or private undertaking, or become directly or indirectly the owner of stock in, or bonds of, any corporation or association; It is quite obvious, therefore, that no Town property, equipment, monies, real estate, or buildings may be given or loaned to private individuals, group or association.

May Town equipment or properties, such as highway equipment be exchanged or traded where the principal of a loan or gift is not involved?

The opinions of the State Controller clearly state this procedure is not allowable.

In 1960, Opinion 102, Volume 16, Page 56, the State Controller stated as follows:

It is well settled that public equipment may not be used for the sole benefit of private individuals or corporations. This is true whether or not the equipment is rented to private individuals (1948 Opinion State Controller #3148 - unreported); used by private persons without charge therefore (Constitution Article VIII, Section 1, 9 Opinion State Controller 433 (1953) or operated by town itself for the benefit of private individuals. 14 Opinion State Controller 124 (1958).

The State Controller has further stated that a municipality may not lease its equipment for private construction work, even for a rental consideration. 1960 Opinion State Controller.

The above opinions not only apply to Town Highway equipment but to all public monies, properties, lands, buildings etc.

Supervisor Sedovy stated that the report of the Town Attorney clearly stated that it is improper for Town equipment to be used by a private contractor and

therefore that this could not be done again. Mr. Sedovy stated that Mr. Luno was a very practical person and being a practical individual he thought that this was Mr. Luno's way of doing it to save money for the Town. Highway Superintendent Luno agreed to this.

Town Attorney Maxwell stated that as he has a 24% interest in the Park Lane Sub-division, he would like it known that he had no idea of what was being done, as he, (The Boston Land Corp.) had a contract with Robert Smolinski to oil and stone the road. Mr. Maxwell also stated that the Town Board was aware that he had agreed to resign as Town Attorney in 1970 at the time he was considering an interest in the Park Lane Sub-division. He stated that he never appeared before the Planning Board which has exclusive sub-division approval, at the time they were considering approval of the subdivision but rather the corporation hired another attorney to appear. He also noted that the sub-division was built beyond the Town's sub-division requirements and that this was done because he wanted a sub-division that he could be proud of.

Mr. Robert Smolinski presented bills for oil and stone to Supervisor Sedovy and stated that he used the Town Highway roller for about 2½ hours and that in exchange furnished about 3 hours of bulldozing for the Town.

It was also brought out that slag was being stored by Mr. Smolinski behind the highway garage, apart from the Town's stone.

Justice Stromecki praised Highway Superintendent Luno for his honesty and integrity. Supervisor Sedovy asked if there were any questions from the floor and there were none.

It was noted that the Colonial Drive Sub-division law suit is still not settled. A letter was read from the Erie County Health Department in regard to the sub-division which had been sent to the Modern Home Builders on September 29, 1972. Town Attorney Maxwell asked that this letter be held until the Judge makes his decision.

It was noted by Supervisor Sedovy that the Colonial Sub-division Builder representatives were present. They stated that they had no comment at this time.

A motion was made by Councilman Kennedy and seconded by Justice Tills to amend the resolution creating the Conservation Advisory Council Adopted on August 4, 1971 as follows:

Referring to the outline of the Powers, Duties, and Responsibilities of said Board as attached to the Resolution, I would like to amend Section-3 Subsection regarding MEMBERSHIP to read as follows: (1) The Council shall consist of (9) nine members who shall be appointed by the Town Board and who shall serve at the pleasure of the Town Board and such ex-officio members as provided herein. Persons residing within the Town of Boston who are genuinely interested in the improvement and preservation of environmental quality shall be eligible for appointment as a member of the Council. Vacancies on the Council shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment except that a vacancy occurring other than by the expiration of term of office shall be filled only for the remainder of the unexpired term. The membership of the Council shall be composed of individuals who have a diversity of backgrounds and experience and as provided by Section 239 (Y) of the General Municipal Law the Town Board may appoint.

ADDITIONAL APPOINTMENTS

Three (3) of the additional members shall be appointed for a term of one (1) year and one (1) member shall be appointed for a term of two (2) years. Thereafter the successors of all initial appointees, except the filling of vacancies shall be for a term of two (2) years.

*Note: This will leave 6 remaining members on the Board with three (3) appointees each year.

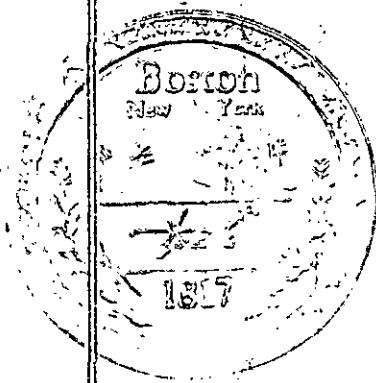

Supervisor Sedovy stated if the resolution is passed to establish Water District #2, there are ten days to submit exhibits with Audit and Control which New York State requires. Supervisor Sedovy stated that at the close of the Public Hearing this can be approved by the Town Board or tabled. If approved by Audit and Control, it has to meet the time table set by HUD of December 1, 1972, which must then approve this in order to receive the 50% cost of construction. Supervisor Sedovy reported on the area that will be serviced by Water District #2 and also on the cost per thousand of assessed valuation for each home in the District. They are as follows:

East Hill	\$27.30 per thousand	\$.75 per thousand for those in District who do not benefit immediately, to cover engineering costs
West Hill	\$27.30 per thousand	\$1.50 per thousand for those in District who do not benefit immediately, to cover engineering costs.

It was noted by Supervisor Sedovy that the approximate cost for hook up would be \$201.65. This includes construction costs. Paul Ballachino asked if Lower East Hill Road was in the District and Mrs. James Bradey inquired about Shero Road. Alexis Link asked if Route 277 was included in Water District #2, and Supervisor Sedovy reported all were included in the District but not in the immediate benefit area. Mr. Johannsen asked about Cole Road and was told Cole Road is in the District but not in the immediate benefit area and how long before it will benefit depends on the need and population growth. Supervisor Sedovy reported that after interviewing many people there seemed to be no need or desire to have water in some sections of the East Hill and if these sections had been included it would have raised the cost as a pumping station would have been needed to get water over the hill. Paula Koester asked why both East and West Hill were in Water District #2 and Supervisor Sedovy stated the reason being so there would not be a lot of mini districts. He stated a hope that the Town would only need three Water Districts and not become unwieldy such as Orchard Park where there are 27. The third Water District will be established when the population growth warrents it.

Justice Stromecki stated there is a great need for water in his area; the West Hill, and asked anyone from that area to express themselves. Mr. Joseph Marci who lives on Hywood Drive felt that this would be a tax burden for the people on Hywood. He noted that everyone on that Drive has sufficient water. Supervisor Sedovy stated that Glenn Terrace, Zimmerman and other streets in the area of Hywood have polluted wells and most do not have enough water to do a wash. Councilman Schunk stated that the cost per thousand would drop as more houses were built. Mr. Ed Green stated that fire insurance rates would drop because of the Water District. Paula Koester asked if a public vote would be taken in regard to Water District #2. Supervisor Sedovy stated no it would not, but a referendum can be forced if 5% of the people in this area sign a petition. Justice Tills stated that if we wait 5 years from now it will cost so many dollars more. He stated that as the area expands the cost will come down. He felt if we waited 5 years we would be negligent and would be cheaper for Tax payers if it went in now because in 5 years when sewers will possibly come in, the cost to tax payers in Water District #2 will be down. He felt that when we look back 5 years from now we will see we made the right move. Karen Klinczar asked what the cost had been to tax payers when Water District #1 was first established. Town Clerk Klein noted it was approximately \$13.00 and had been estimated at \$21 or \$22. It then dropped to \$10.00 because more aid was received from the government. This year the rate was \$8.06. Councilman Schunk stated it depended on growth and Councilman Kennedy stated that water stimulates growth.

A letter was read from Fred Shear, Chief of the North Boston Fire Company requesting Hydrant C-56 at the B-Kwik Market be repaired. The Town Clerk was directed to write a letter to the Erie County Water Authority to correct the situation.

A notice of Appropriation was served on the Town of Boston by the New York State Department of Transportation regarding water lines on two parcels of land taken by the State for the construction of the Southern Expressway. Town Attorney Maxwell was requested to look into this matter and report at the next Town Board meeting.

A letter was read from the Capital Improvements Committee recommending the approval of a Bond Resolution in the amount of \$323,000.00 to finance the proposed new Town Hall. A sketch of the Town Hall was shown and Supervisor Sedovy described the floor plan and overall dimensions. There was a lengthy discussion in regard to setting up a referendum for December 13, 1972, so the people of the Town can express their approval or disapproval. The question of the Bond was discussed and it was felt that a Bond Council should be consulted so everything is set up properly before it is brought to the public in the form of a referendum. There was discussion in regard to putting it up on a referendum twice. Once to get the approval to build and second to approve a Bond Issue. Town Attorney Maxwell agreed to contact the Town of Clarence to get a resolution from them and also he will contact a Bond Council in New York City. There was a suggestion by Supervisor Sedovy that the Bond issue be for 30 years. The matter of the Bond Resolution and referendum was tabled until the next meeting. Town Clerk Klein noted that he must notify the Board of Election requesting use of the Poll files and that this be done soon before they begin pulling poll files of individuals who have not voted in the last 2 years. Mr. Klein reported that the Board of Elections will set up the machines for the referendum, but the Town will have to pay for the printed material.

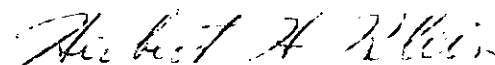

Judge Stromecki presented the following resolution and moved its adoption.

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Boston, New York, by a resolution duly adopted on the 4th day of September, 1968, and pursuant to Section 200 of the Town Law, duly accepted an offer and bid for the construction of approximately one thousand (1,000) feet of highway according to Town specifications of Crestwood Circle, Town of Boston, New York, running easterly from the intersection of Chestnut Ridge Road and Crestwood Circle, at a total cost, including surveying, of Five Thousand One Hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$5,100.00) of such costs shall be paid from the proceeds of Bond obligations to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law, and

WHEREAS, A portion of said bond obligation to the extent of \$2,400.00 plus accrued interest has been redeemed from the levy of real property taxes and the payment of part of said assessment all from a source other than the proceeds of a bond in compliance with the provisions of Section 23.00 (b) of the Local Finance Law, leaving a balance due thereon of \$2,700.00, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

1. The specific object or purpose for which obligations are to be issued pursuant to this resolution is to finance the balance of the cost of said construction of Crestwood Circle as a public highway located in the Town of Boston, New York.

2. The maximum balance of the cost of such construction is \$2,700.00, as required by the terms of the proposal, and the plan of financing of such cost is as follows:

The balance of the cost of \$2,700.00 is to be provided by the issuance of Serial Bonds in the total amount of \$2,700.00, consisting of six (6) separate bonds each in the amount of \$450.00 pursuant to this resolution.

3. The following determinations are hereby made;

A. The period of probable usefulness of such highway is at least ten (10) years.

B. The subdivision of paragraph (a) of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law is applicable in the circumstances is Subdivision "2 (b)".

C. The proposed maturity of the obligations authorized by this resolution will not be in excess of six (6) years.

4. That the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, issue its serial bonds in the amount of \$2,700.00 to finance such cost in accordance with the financial plan herein set forth. Such bonds shall be dated and the power to fix and determine the exact date of such bonds is hereby delegated to the Supervisor.

5. Such bonds shall be numbered 1 through 6, inclusive, and shall be in the total amount of \$2,700.00 and shall mature in numerical order in annual installments in the years, as follows: on November 7, 1973; on November 7, 1974; on November 7, 1975; on November 7, 1976; on November 7, 1977; on November 7, 1978; each in the amount of \$450.00. The bonds shall be issued in bearer form without coupons and shall contain a power to convert to registered form in accordance with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The bonds shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding 6 per centum per annum. Payments of such interest shall be evidenced by notation thereon on the bonds at the time of payment. The bonds shall be substantially in the form of the proposed bond which is attached hereto and made a part hereof of this resolution.

6. The Supervisor is hereby delegated the power to prepare such bonds and to sell such bonds at private sale at not less than par and accrued interest, and at such sale to fix the interest to be borne by such bonds within the limitations set forth in this resolution. The Supervisor shall deliver such bond to the purchaser thereof only against cash or a certified check. The proceeds of sale of the bond shall be deposited in a special bank account as required by Section 165.00 of the Local Finance Law and the powers, delegated to the Supervisor by this resolution shall be exercised in the conformity with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

7. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. A bond anticipation note in the amount of shall be issued by the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, for the purpose aforesaid and in anticipation of the sale of serial bonds of said Town of Boston in the amount of \$2,700, as aforesaid, heretofore authorized by said resolution adopted at this meeting, entitled: "Serial Bond Resolution Dated November 4, 1969, Construction of Crestwood Circle Highway, Boston, New York." Such bond anticipation note hereby authorized is a renewal note of a portion of the original note approved by this Board November 7, 1968.

2. Such note shall be dated November 6, 1970 or such later date as the Supervisor by his execution thereof will determine, will mature on November 6, 1973, will bear interest at the rate not exceeding 5-1/4 per centum per annum payable at maturity, will be payable as to both principal and interest in lawful money of the United States of America at the Manufacturers and Traders Trust Company, Buffalo, New York, and will be signed in the name of the Town of Boston, by the Supervisor, attested to by the Town Clerk of the Town of Boston, and will be sealed with the seal of said Town of Boston.

3. The said bond anticipation note shall be of substantially the same terms, forms and contents as the form of the note hereto annexed to this resolution.

A letter was read from the Maplewood Cemetery Association requesting the Boston Town Board to relocate the recycling center when it reopens in the Spring. The letter also noted that although the center was supposed to be closed about November 1, 1972, on November 25, 1972 there were still barrels of glass. Highway Superintendent Luno stated that all this has now been taken care of. The Town Clerk was directed to write a letter to the Maplewood Cemetery Association explaining that the recycling center has been dismantled and next year the center will be located in another place.

A letter was read from the Erie County Department of Public Works in reply to a letter written to them on November 16, 1972, requesting that they investigate the drainage problem in the Meadow Drive and Northside Drive area. The letter stated that they felt they have no direct responsibility. Supervisor Sedovy noted there is an established problem in this area, and as this is on private property, Supervisor Sedovy suggested that the Town Board meet with the residents of this area and offer them counseling to help them find ways to alleviate the problem. There was also discussion on setting up a Special District to take care of these drainage problems in the Town. The Town Clerk was directed to have an item on the next Town agenda where the Town Board can take up this problem.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Transportation in reply to the Town's letter of June 7, 1972 requesting that the speed limit on Zimmerman Road be reduced. The letter stated that as there is not enough culture in this area, they must deny the Town's request. Justice Stromecki stated that he felt statements in the letter were contradictory as there are posted speeds on Zimmerman Road proving there is danger.

of the repair of Water Lines under 18 Mile Creek of Water District
No. 1 of the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York.

2. The maximum cost of such repair and reconstruction is
\$6,612.00, as required by the terms of the proposal of \$6,612.00
and the plan of financing of such cost is as follows:

The sum of \$12.00 to be provided from the current
funds available in the Water District Budget and the
balance of the cost is to be provided by the issuance of
Serial Bonds in the total amount of \$6,600.00, consisting
of five (5) separate bonds each in the amount of \$1,320.00,
pursuant to this resolution.

3. The following determinations are hereby made;

- A. The period of probable usefulness of such reconstruction is at least five (5) years.
- B. The subdivision of Paragraph (a) of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law is applicable in the circumstances, is Subdivision 1.
- C. The proposed maturity of the obligations authorized by this resolution will not be in excess of five (5) years.

4. That the Water District No. 1 of the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, issue its Serial Bonds in the amount of \$6,600 to finance such cost in accordance with the financial plan set forth above. Such bonds shall be dated approximately as of the date of the completion and acceptance of said repair and reconstruction, and the power to fix and determine the exact date of such bonds is hereby delegated to the Supervisor.

5. Such bonds shall be numbered 1 through 5, inclusive, and shall be in the total amount of \$6,600.00 in the denomination of \$1,320.00 each, and shall mature in numerical order in annual installments on December 6, in the years and amounts, as follows:
1973 - \$1,320.00; 1974 - \$1,300.00; 1975 - \$1,320.00;

The power to determine the date upon which such installments shall become due and payable is delegated to the Supervisor. The bonds shall be issued in bearer form without coupons, and shall contain a power to convert to registered form, in accordance with the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The bonds shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding 4.75 per cent per annum. Payments of such interest shall be evidenced by notation thereon on the bonds at the time of payment. PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing was held at the Boston Town Hall on December 12 1972, at 8:00 P.M. to consider the pros and cons of a new Town Hall.

Those present were Councilman Schunk, Councilman Kennedy, Justice Tills, Justice Stromecki, Supervisor Sedovy, Town Clerk Klein, Town Attorney Maxwell, Town Engineer Moncreiff and Guy Baldwin, architect of the proposed new building. Capital Improvements Committee members present were Charles Decker, David Zimmerman, Donald Genzel, Betty Wells, Richard Paulus, and Maurice Emerling.

The hearing was opened by Supervisor Sedovy who thanked all for coming. He asked that people spread the word as to what was said tonight and he also stated that any organization in Town that would like to have a Board member or a member of the Capital Improvements Committee to attend one of their meetings to show slides and give a talk on the new Town Hall, to contact him.

Supervisor Sedovy stated that approximately two years ago an engineer was hired to look over the present Town Hall to see what was right about the building and what was wrong. Mr. Ken King, the engineer, reported that the building did not meet the Building Code and was at the end of its long and useful life. In recent months Town Engineer Moncreiff was asked to organize a group of experts in heating, electricity and construction to inspect the Town Hall. Town Engineer Moncreiff was asked to summarize the findings of these experts. The names of the experts were not divulged upon their request. They conducted this inspection free of charge.

Town Engineer Moncreiff stated that he had been charged with the responsibility of checking out the basic structure, general safety of the building and to estimate the cost to correct deficiencies to make the building structurally sound to meet Building and Fire Codes. He noted that two organizations were enlisted to help; they were New York State Board of Fire Underwriters and the Inspection Division of the New York State Department of Labor. The Town Engineer read from a report that had been presented to the Town Board a few months ago which summarized the findings. He noted that there could be a fire hazard present and the State Department of Labor showed a violation of Code 36 which deals with buildings used for Public use. The people who assisted in this inspection had no stated authority so they could not say 'correct these problems or close up'. Town Engineer Moncreiff noted that there were a number of structural deficiencies that were found and he felt that there were possibly more that they could not see without taking off the siding. In the South East corner of the building one beam has sheared or rotted away and this is causing a sag of about 6". There are 50 or 60 bricks that were left in the ceiling after a chimney was torn down and this is causing extra weight. The continuous beam in the middle has failed although the corner posts appear in fairly good condition. Town Engineer Moncreiff again stated there is a possibility of more problems in the structure, but they could not get to them. He noted that a high wind would be hazardous as the roof rafters are rotted and the knee braces need adjustment.

Town Engineer Moncreiff also noted that there are a number of Fire Code violations. The service conductors are not good, the utility area should not be in the rest room, nonmetallic cables which are presently used are not approved, cables are not properly fastened, the present breakers are in violation, the outlet boxes are not proper, and the appliance receptacles are not grounded as the code requires. Town Engineer Moncreiff stated that the State Department of Labor went through the building and also found a number of deficiencies. It was noted that if the Town Hall was a theater, bar, or restaurant that charged a fee for attendance it would be closed immediately. The seating capacity of the Town Hall is 150 people and Code 36.2.2 dictates that there be two exits. At the present there are two doors at the front but only one exit and the door hardware violates the code as there is a trip bolt on the door and a person unaware of this would not be able to open it. Exit doors should contain panic hardware. There are no exit signs which is a violation. The heating system is in violation as it should be enclosed in a separate room, having a fire resistance rating of one hour. The warm air ducts should have dampers that open and close. If a fire should start it would spread rapidly because of the present ducts. Town Engineer Moncreiff stated that the sanitation facilities are in violation as the code requires two lavatories, one for men and one for women. The building only has one.

The general deficiencies of the Town Hall were also given by Town Engineer Moncreiff. He noted that there was very little security for Town Records as the building is vulnerable to vandalism and would be very easy to break into. The only facility for records is in the Assessors Office downstairs. Other problems noted were the difficulty in maintaining the building as to housekeeping chores, and the many leaks that are present in the roof. Also noted was the limited space available for parking. There is room for parking across the street, but Town Engineer Moncreiff noted that this could be dangerous especially for children, and the State Department of Transportation would have to be approached to set up a crossing if the present Town Hall is used. He also noted that a crossing would only work if people abided by it and if it was controlled by the Police.

Town Engineer Moncreiff noted that land adjacent to the Town Hall had been looked into to provide facilities for a long term use and for enlargement of the present site, which is not large enough for any expansion.

Town Engineer Moncreiff then went into the costs to make minimum repairs and improvements on the present Town Hall. He noted that this is a dangerous area, as after remodelling is started it might be found that costs were not properly estimated. He also noted that the remodeling of the basement had been looked into to provide office space and to enclose the furnace area and the water heater. An office would be put in for the Assessors, Town Clerk and Tax Collector and a very small area for the Supervisor. Also a small conference room is considered. The estimated cost of this is \$43,000. It is anticipated that the building will then be used for five years possibly ten, primarily because of population growth and the need for space. Town Engineer Moncreiff stated that an annex north of the present Town Hall had been considered with an entry between the present building and annex. An estimated cost of \$170,000 for the annex plus \$8,000.00 for the work to be done on the present building to remodel the basement. The total cost would not be less than \$221,000, and a 10 to 12 percent increase could be expected into 1973.

Supervisor Sedovy reviewed the cost as presented by Town Engineer Moncreiff and they were broken down as follows:

\$35,000	cost to correct structure
8,000	cost to remodel building
178,000	to construct an annex

\$221,000 minimum cost

Supervisor Sedovy stated that the cost of \$43,000 is for only minimum requirements. He also stated that it is the job of the Town Board to enforce Building Codes and they have been aware for a number of months that the present building does not meet the minimum code requirements. They felt it would be foolish to start repair work on the building as it is not practical to fix the building because if money was spent the Board was not sure if they would have to put more money in at a later date as not much is known about the underneath. It was felt that good money would be spent and then perhaps in 5 or 10 years a new building would have to be planned and building costs would be more. Supervisor Sedovy stated that the present building is inadequate for now and the future as the Town of Boston is the fastest growing Town in Erie County percentage wise and with the advent of the of the Southern Expressway, because of the accessibility to Buffalo it will grow faster. Also noted was the economic conditions which have greatly improved in this area. Supervisor Sedovy stated that in the near future we will be in a position to receive Federal Funds for Sewer and Water and the Town has to be in a position to do a first class job of planning with the proper facilities for the offices in Town. Mr. Guy Baldwin, architect was asked by Supervisor Sedovy to present his series of slides to show the proposed layout.

Three slides were presented by Mr. Baldwin showing the front view of the building, the area to be used as lawn and parking (plot plan) around the building and the interior floor plan. Mr. Baldwin presented these slides and explained each in detail.

Supervisor Sedovy stated that the cost for a new Town Hall would be approximately \$315,000. The financing will be Bonds in the amount of \$250,000. The remainder will be paid by \$26,000 from the Capital Improvements Fund, \$30,000 from Federal Revenue Sharing and \$9,000 from surplus monies in the General Fund. The Bond will be for 30 years at 5½% interest and the maximum by the tax payers would be a raise of \$2.67 per thousand of assessed valuation the first year. The 30th year it would amount to \$.26 and the average over 30 years would be \$1.17 per thousand of assessed valuation. It was noted by Supervisor Sedovy that it would be possible to use the \$30,000 from Revenue Sharing toward the retirement of the Bond and taxes will not have to be raised to build the new Town Hall. He also noted that there would be money left over. He stated that the Federal Government has set a high priority that this Revenue Sharing money be used for Public Safety upgrading and maintaining Building Code standards. Supervisor Sedovy asked Justice Tills to report on the advantages of a new Town Hall.

Judge Tills stated that there were many problems with the present building and as the Town is growing it is necessary to furnish facilities to better manage the Town. He noted that the Court is now using secretarial help two mornings a week at the Town Hall. If a person has a question and tries to reach the proper authority they go from pillar to post. If the Town had a central unit it would pull the Town together.

A new Town Hall would be a unifying factor for the Government to operate more effectively. Also with the new structure a consideration would be given to combining the office of Town Clerk and Tax Collector so a person could have that as a full time job. At the present time secretarial help has to go from house to house and a new structure would enable a secretary to be at the Town Hall to serve all Town Officials at a central location. Justice Tills noted that at the present time Town records are in homes and the records of the Court are at the Town Hall. The Court records are accessible to anyone that would break in and these are personal records. Judge Tills noted that if the new Town Hall was not built that besides the cost of remodeling the present building it would also be necessary to remodel the Ambulance Squad Building and the building used by the Boston Police Department. He stated that the Ambulance and Police Department would both be housed in the new Town Hall. Justice Tills noted that there would be a large assembly room in the new facility with cement floor that can be used for Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Baby Clinic, etc; a room that could be used as a central location for the people of Town. Justice Tills stated that there were many reasons for a new Town Hall and one of the most important would be to serve the people better in a faster way.

Supervisor Sedovy stated that the basic issue on the referendum will be the approval of the Bond for \$250,000. If a yes is given then a new Town Hall will be built. If no then we will be forced to renovate at a cost of \$43,000.00 or \$35,000.00. Supervisor Sedovy stated they were now ready for questions from the floor.

Mr. John Walters of Fedick Road asked just what are we talking about in the new Building that will cost \$315,000. He also asked why the steeple on top was necessary and if they felt it had to be put up. He stated that this must add from \$1,000 to \$1,500 to the cost. He also wanted to know why a canopy was necessary over the front entrance. He felt that a plain fronted building would be sufficient. He also asked the Town Engineer how Romax Electrical lines and Industrial Code could apply to the present Town Hall.

Town Engineer Moncreiff replied to Mr. Walter's question in regard to the electrical lines by stating that this was necessary in all places of Public Assembly and would apply the same as a theater although we do not charge admission.

Mr. Walters stated that he took exception to this as he did not feel that it was applicable in this situation. He also noted that in Buffalo if a building had been built before the code, the code would not apply. Mr. Walters also asked if the new building had a sprinkler system. He felt that if the present building was remodeled a sprinkler system should be included.

Mr. Baldwin stated that no sprinkler system was planned for the new Town Hall, but one could be installed in the corridors and lobby. Justice Tills noted that the new building was to be fire resistant. Mr. Baldwin stated that if it was a many storied building in Buffalo he would say that a sprinkler system was necessary. A sprinkler system would cost approximately \$8,000. Mr. Baldwin went on to answer the other questions of Mr. Walters by stating that they had tried their best to design a simple building. The cupola on the top will serve as an air intake and there will be two dormers on the back for this purpose also. He noted that the canopy on the front contributed to the looks of the building.

Mr. Walters stated that there was always a possibility of fires from gasoline and waste baskets and no building is truly fire proof, so he felt that in the true interest of the Town a sprinkler system should be installed. Supervisor Sedovy requested that Mr. Baldwin look into a sprinkler system if he feels it is advisable and to report to the Town Board and they will consider it.

Mr. Baldwin went on to answer more of Mr. Walters questions in regard to the way the \$315,000 will be spent. At the present construction rate it will cost approximately \$30 a square foot. The building will be constructed of reinforced concrete and steel. The exterior will be of brick which are the least expensive at approximately 10¢ a piece. There will be a small amount of Indiana Limestone around the windows. The flat part of the roof will be a built up roof of tar paper and stone and the pitched part will be asbestos shingles. The interior will be block or concrete with drywall and sheet vinyl wainscoting which can be cleaned with a wet cloth. There will be ceramic in the toilets. The roof will be a metal deck on a steel frame. The stairs will be steel and the interior doors are to be of wood. Exterior doors and windows will be aluminum. The only plaster will be in the toilet rooms. The interior ceilings will be of acoustical sheeting. There will be a judges bench in the Court. The heat will be forced warm air, electrical will be rigid conduits, lighting will be incandescent and fluorescent. Piping in the new Town Hall will be copper. New York Telephone for communication and water from the Erie County Water Authority. Sewers will be a sand filter with a septic tank.

Mr. William Lyon of Cloverfield Drive asked what materials would be used in the parking lot and if this is included in the cost. Mr. Baldwin stated that the parking lot is to be of stone and the Town Highway Department will do this work and the cost of materials is included in the total cost. Mr. Lyon also asked what would happen to the present building. Supervisor Sedovy stated that this was a hard question to answer. He noted there were a number of options; one being to deed it over to the cemetery. Mr. Lyon stated he felt it could be sold. He also noted that no provisions had been made for the Highway Superintendent in the new building. Supervisor Sedovy stated that Mr. Luno has an office in the Highway Building and would continue to use that office. Supervisor Sedovy stated that the Town also owns the Police Department Building and the Rescue Squad Building. He noted that one of the buildings could possibly be used as a recycling center although this hasn't been looked into. Mr. Lyon felt that the sale of these buildings would reduce costs. Supervisor Sedovy noted that the operating costs of a larger building would be comparable to maintaining the present buildings. He stated that there was property value on the old buildings.

Mr. Lyon stated that the present Town Hall property could possibly be used to expand the cemetery.

Justice Tills pointed out that the parking area could be used when there is Little League Football and baseball and also when the new equipment for the smaller children is installed.

Mr. Tom Rauch asked if any other estimates had been received. Supervisor Sedovy reported that 10 or 11 architects had been interviewed and from these three were chosen and then from the three Mr. Baldwin was hired as it was felt he was capable of furnishing us the services needed at the lowest fee which is 7%. Supervisor Sedovy stated that the cost estimate is not final. The final cost will be determined when the bids come in. The price of \$315,000 was obtained from the cost of buildings similar to this. Councilman Schunk stated that there was a possibility that the bids might come in lower. When the price of \$315,000 was used it was to make sure it was enough to cover the construction of a new Building.

Mr. Sidney McAllister asked if it was possible that Revenue Sharing would eventually pay for the new building. Supervisor Sedovy stated that Revenue Sharing was on a five (5) year plan and at the end of 5 years it would be reviewed and he felt there was a strong possibility it would be renewed.

Mr. McAllister then asked why was the increase in taxes brought up. Supervisor Sedovy answered that at the time the 1973 Budget was drawn up the amount of Revenue Sharing the Town of Boston would receive was not known. He stated that some time ago an attempt was made to determine how much the Town would receive and no figures were available. The amount the Town would receive was only known a few days ago.

Justice Tills noted that without the Revenue Sharing the cost to the Tax payers would be \$2.67 per thousand of Assessed valuation. He stated that the question was do we want to take \$45,000 to remodel the present facilities. He also noted that construction costs have gone up considerably since the time the present building was purchased as a stop gap measure. He stated that the feeling was that we do not think the way to spend money is to throw it away on repairing the old building.

Mr. McAllister stated that he felt all the people should be informed of this Revenue Sharing. Supervisor Sedovy stated that all organizations in Town had been sent a letter telling them of a speaker bureau that has been set up to give information to the people.

Mr. Lyon asked how a cost of \$323,000 had gotten into the News media and also a tax increase of \$3.23 per thousand. Supervisor Sedovy stated that air conditioning had been dropped as unnecessary although the ducts will be put in for air conditioning in case at a future date it is decided that it should be put in the building. Justice Tills stated that the figures were erroneous. He noted that the Buffalo Evening News and the Buffalo Courier have been trying to relate the facts and things can be misquoted. He noted that when people read something in the paper they take it as fact. Justice Tills stated there was talk of paying off the new building in five years and possibly the figures came from this. The reason 25 or 30 years has been decided is that the people that use the Town Hall should pay for it and not just the people living here in that five year period. He stated that meetings like this Public Hearing are good as the true facts can be presented to the people.

Councilman Schunk noted that the cost will not be sure until the bids are in. Justice Tills added that the Town could build a Town Hall as long as the bids were less than the amount put on the referendum but if the bids exceeded the amount of the referendum then we wouldn't be able to build.

Supervisor Sedovy stated that the new building should last 20 to 25 years without touching it and the building is so planned that if it should be added onto the beauty would not be destroyed.

Supervisor Sedovy stated that he felt a parallel could be drawn between our Town and Colden. Sixteen years ago Colden built a new Town Hall for between \$40,000 and \$50,000. Colden is one-half the size of Boston. They have a building with offices and meeting rooms. The Town of Boston bought a building which is now totally inadequate for the Town. There have to be plans for the future.

Mr. Livingston Lasso asked that the Horse be put before the cart. He questioned what would happen with the Rescue Squad Building, the Police Department Building and the present Town Hall building. He also asked if there were any costs for demolishing. Supervisor Sedovy stated that he felt no costs would be incurred. He stated that there has been suggestions as to moving the Rescue Squad building and using it in the park. There has been thoughts of using the Police Dept. building for a recycling center and Supervisor Sedovy noted that he has been contacted by someone to buy the Town Hall and a meeting has been set up at a future date. Mr. Lasso asked how any one could use the building if it was in such bad shape. Justice Stromecki stated that it could not be used for Public Assembly. The Town Engineer stated that when the building was inspected it was for Public Safety and the findings didn't mean that the building was totally unable to be used. Supervisor Sedovy asked the Town Engineer if there was a stipulation which made the code different and more critical for Public Assembly. Town Engineer Moncreiff stated that one of the things was one toilet. If only males were using the building one would be sufficient, if male and female there have to be two. He noted that a buyer would have to look into this. He also stated that he has been told that a coat of paint would be all that was needed to improve the looks of the building. He felt that if the primer coat was 8 inches of "reinforced concrete" it might work. Supervisor Sedovy stated that he felt the present building won't cost the Town to dispose of it, but will bring in money. Justice Tills noted that even if the building was torn down the lot could be sold and the amount received would pay for the costs.

Mr. Lasso asked how much is the cost of interest. Supervisor Sedovy noted that at the present time it was 5½%. Mr. Lasso asked if there is an estimate from a Bonding Company. Supervisor Sedovy answered that they had talked to M & T and that the exact interest rate will not be known for sure until the time the Bond is issued. Mr. Lasso wanted to know if the cost of equipment was included in the total costs. Supervisor Sedovy also noted that most of the present equipment will be used in the new Town Hall.

Mr. Lasso asked how much of the Town Park land will be used for the building. Supervisor Sedovy stated that none of the land used for recreation will be taken. It was noted that this land had been bought for a new Town Hall a few years ago.

Mr. Lasso asked for an estimate of the utilities. Mr. Baldwin stated that the cost would be approximately \$3,200. This would be heat, light and air conditioning. Supervisor Sedovy stated that this was a small increase over what is being spent now. The new building will have electric heat as this is less expensive than gas to install. Also to heat with gas a larger heating plant is needed. This estimate

will be less now as the air conditioning is not to be put in.

Mr. Lasso asked if custodian costs would increase. Supervisor Sedovy and Justice Tills noted there would be an increase in this, but not a great one.

Mr. Lasso noted that with the ambulance in the rear of the building he felt there might be times when a snow storm would prevent them from getting out. Councilman Schunk noted that this would be the first place plowed. Mr. Lasso stated that where they are now there is no difficulty in getting on the highway. Supervisor Sedovy noted that all will make sure they get out. Mr. Terry Link a member of the Rescue Squad, said that at least they won't have to back across Rt. 219 which is what they do now and presents a dangerous situation.

Mr. Lasso stated that he would like to go into the growth figures of the Town; the 1960 census showed 5,100 people, 1970 census showed 7,100 people, so at this rate 1980 would show 9,100 people. He also noted that the Master Plan for 1970 estimated 10,000 to 14,000 people. He said that he felt the Town had a champagne appetite with a beer income. He also stated that at the last Town Board meeting Councilman Schunk stated that the building would be safe for a few more year. Councilman Schunk stated that this was not what he had said. He noted it was more like the reason the Board had not taken action sooner was because they didn't feel it would fall down for a few years. Judge Tills stated that he didn't feel it was a question of champagne appetite, but was important to plan now or we won't be able to afford to live here. He noted that the cost for Water District #2 is way up from the cost that Water District #1 was. He noted that if we wait five years, construction costs will be way up. He felt this was the cheaper way to do rather than be caught like Orchard Park with all costs coming at once. Mr. Lasso stressed the amount of interest that could be saved in one year if a new building wasn't erected. Justice Tills stated that when planning for a new Town Hall began the interest rates were 7% and now 5 1/2% was the going rate. He felt if we waited we could be paying 9%. Ten years from now we could look at ourselves and suffer because of what we did tonight. Supervisor Sedovy noted that interest at the present was at the lowest rate of the higher level.

Mr. Guy Fitch asked that if a \$250,000 Bond is passed would this be no cost to me at the end of the year. Supervisor Sedovy stated that Revenue Sharing would cover the costs for five years and at the end of that time would be renewed or dropped and during the five years that with Revenue Sharing there would be no increase in taxes to property owners to build a new Town Hall. Mr. Fitch asked if the amount above the \$250,000 would come out of present funds and Supervisor Sedovy answered that this money has been set aside. Mr. Fitch wanted to know if frills would be added and if the Town had to limit themselves to an amount that would be spent. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that it is set in the referendum how much the Bond would be for. Mr. Maxwell read from a sample referendum and stated that this would be the amount spent as it is the amount voted on.

Mr. John Koza asked why this windfall (Revenue Sharing) could not be used for a Town Swimming Pool for the kids. Supervisor Sedovy stated that a committee is working on this project and they are getting an organization together which will use private funds

rather than public funds. This would be done so that people who want to use the pool will pay for it and those not interested will not find they are paying for something they don't want.

Mr. Herbert Berlin stated that he was new in the area and noted that there was growth in all suburban areas and he noted that by 1983 the population should be approximately 14,500. He also noted that he had pride in Boston and would like to show his friends a new Town Hall. Supervisor Sedovy noted that he felt there would be a large rate of growth because of the Southern Expressway.

Mrs. Carolyn Shadle stated that she was not going to speak for or against centralized and safe facilities, but she felt the question was what the people can pay. She felt that we all knew what we could personally pay for school and county taxes and she said people would have to decide where they wanted their money spent in the future. She stated that maybe a wise investment would be sewers in a few years. She wondered if people voted for a new Town Hall if they would be able to vote for sewers when the time came and later money to provide recreational space. Will people have enough money. The question is will they want material things for themselves or for their community. Supervisor Sedovy stated that when the Conservation Bond issue was passed from 7 to 9 priorities were listed, and one of the first priorities was our County Sewer Districts. He noted that as the funds become available 75% to 92% of the sewer costs will be paid by Federal Funds, and this will make it easier for people to afford Sewers. Justice Tills stated that it could be 10 years before sewers will come as there will have to be growth out of Hamburg along Taylor Road. He noted that if we wait and do everything at once this will cost, but good planning can minimize this.

Mrs. Paula Koester asked why the entire building had to be completed in a full shot. Supervisor Sedovy stated that there would not be enough room and would not serve the Town. He noted that the new Assembly room was needed for Scouts and Community activities. Mrs. Koester noted that Hamburg uses other facilities for meetings. Supervisor Sedovy stated that he had talked to a man in Hamburg who said that the meeting room and Assembly room at their Town Hall was a good investment and was used a lot. Supervisor Sedovy stated that we need this as a central location for the Town in order to hold the Town together. Mrs. Koester asked if the youth would be able to use the new Town Hall. Supervisor Sedovy answered yes they would.

Mr. Beckwith asked if the Town Hall would be on an elevation with 219 or if it would set on a knoll. Mr. Baldwin stated that it is approximately one foot above 219.

Mr. Walters asked what would be done to the old building that would cost \$38,000. He asked that the cost of Romax wire not be included as he felt this was not necessary. Town Engineer Moncreiff stated that the fireunderwriters set this as necessary, and he pointed out that each time the furnace comes on the lights dim considerably. Mr. Concreiff reread the New York Board of Fire Underwriters list of changes that had to be made. The costs are as follows: \$35,000 just repairs to correct present deficiencies, trusses in roof \$4,700; emergency exit \$2,800; emergency exit (upper level) \$1,300; toilets \$2,000; Top beam on south wall, take siding off and shim roof boards new shingles and trim \$4,600; septic system \$2,500. (Mr. Moncreiff

noted that parking area would have to be taken to do this); exit hardware, lights and doors \$800; furnace enclosure, fire door, dampers \$3,000; redo electrical also interior work \$9,300. Total \$35,000. Mr. Walters noted that this does not include the sprinkler system. Supervisor Sedovy requested that the sprinkler system be added to this and noted it would cost several thousand.

Mr. Walters asked what there was to insure him that the wind-fall (Revenue Sharing) would be used for the new Town Hall. Supervisor Sedovy stated that we (The Town Board) are committing ourselves. Mr. Walters asked what would happen in five years if revenue sharing was not renewed. Supervisor Sedovy stated that financial planning would have to be used and it might be necessary for a slight tax increase. He noted that money would be set aside in surplus so not to make an increase necessary. He also noted that the first five years would be the costliest.

Mr. Walters stated that he felt if the old Town Hall was repaired properly it should last five or ten years or even longer. Justice Tills stated that what we see in Town Government is a growth within our offices. He noted that the present Town Hall was not adequate for the needs of government. He also stated that he felt it would be more difficult to sell if it was remodded. Supervisor Sedovy stated that the present Town Hall was inadequate now and in five years would be more so. Councilman Kennedy noted that Federal or State money can be obtained for other projects that might come up. Supervisor Sedovy stated that a new Town Hall would mean that work could be done more expedient than now as at the present time a person has to go all over town from office to office.

Mrs. Koza asked why this referendum was not presented at the General Election in November. Supervisor Sedovy stated that it was not ready at that time. Justice Tills stated that it was not ready and also that it was not a good idea to bring it up in the heat of a Presidential Election as it is hard to receive publicity for this when all the pages in a paper are full of news on campaigns.

Mrs. Koza felt that in the middle of winter was a bad time to get the people out to vote. Justice Tills noted that if people are interested enough they will come out to express their opinion. Councilman Kennedy stated that January is a good month to let bids as contractors are looking for work at that time.

Justice Stromecki stated that Supervisor Sedovy had put a lot of work into the planning of a new Town Hall as had the rest of the Board and Captial Improvements Committee. He talked of some of the work that had gone into the planning. He noted that as many as 12 drawings had been presented to the Board by Mr. Baldwin. There were letters from the Police and the Rescue Squad to consider. Justice Stromecki stated that he felt a new Town Hall should be built. He stated that in November there was no idea as to the amount of Revenue Sharing we would get. He also felt that air conditioning should be put into the new Town Hall. He also stated that Justice Tills and others had worked hard to give the Town the best. He pointed out todays needs of the court. The Court system in Town is overloaded and there is no place for parents and children who have business with the court to have privacy.

Mr. Lasso asked what the architects fee would be and if it was

included in the total cost. Supervisor Sedovy stated that it was 7% of the contract and was included in the total cost.

Mrs. Florence Weiss asked where the voting on the referendum would take place. Supervisor Sedovy stated that it would be at the Town Hall. Mrs. Weiss noted that on a regular election day it is mobbed and if all districts were in one place it would cause problems. Town Clerk Klein stated that the matter wasn't settled as they might possibly have another voting place. Mr. Lasso asked if just taxpayers could vote and Supervisor Sedovy stated that registered voters would vote on the referendum. Town Attorney Maxwell noted that voting has to be at least from 8 A.M. to 8 P.M.

Mr. Lyons asked that if when the payment was due on the Bond could the full \$30,000 be applied to it. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that he didn't think so as there were probitions on Bonds for the first 4 or 5 years. Mr. Lyon asked what would happen to the other \$5,000. Supervisor Sedovy stated that the money would have to be budgeted and designated for some use. Mr. Lyon stated that he felt the full amount should be put into the debt. Justice Tills stated that the \$5,000 could possibly be used for a tax break. He stated that he was pleased that Revenue Sharing was to be used to benefit the Town. He also stated that baring a catastrophe, Revenue Sharing should continue beyond the five years. Mr. Lyon asked why the Bond could not be paid off in 20 years instead of 30 years. Supervisor Sedovy said that 5, 10, 20, 30 and 35 years had been considered and it was decided 30 years was a good amount of time. Councilman Schunk stated that the \$5,000 could possibly be put into the Capital Improvements Fund.

Mr. Jehle stated that he felt the presentation was eloquent and well done. He pointed out that he had lived in the Town of Boston all his life. He also commented on some of the previous things said and noted that he had been drinking beer long enough and would like the taste of champagne for a change. He also noted that he agreed with Mr. Berlin and would feel pride to show people a new Town Hall. He also noted that the cupola should be left on the top because it looked good and if it served a purpose it would be all the better. He stated that the Town needed a place to operate out of, and if people were interested they would get out and vote. Mr. Jehle stated that it would be a good idea to put out a brochure explaining the new Town Hall to the Taxpayers. Supervisor Sedovy questioned Town Attorney Maxwell if this could be done at the taxpayers expense and the Town Attorney stated that it could if it was just for the presentation of facts.

The Public Hearing was closed at 11:00 P. M. and Supervisor Sedovy thanked all for coming.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The construction of a new Town Hall in and for the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, including equipment, machinery and apparatus necessary therefor, and the grading and improvement of the site thereof on lands owned by the Town, fronting on Boston State Road, in said Town, is hereby authorized.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$315,000 and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- a) By the issuance of \$250,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; and
- b) By the use of \$65,000 surplus funds of said Town available therefor and hereby appropriated for such purpose.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probably usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is thirty years, pursuant to subdivision 11 (a) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law

It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of an interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property in said Town a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds may be contested only if:

- 1) Such bonds are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provision of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of publication, or

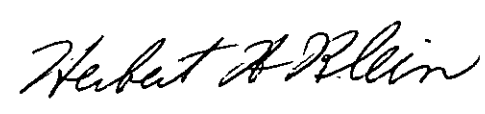

He also noted that a cost of living clause had also been put in the contract. Supervisor Sedovy commended the Fire Companies on the excellent job they had done before meeting to discuss the contracts. He also commended them on the excellent job done each year and he noted that the fact had been brought up that they know their business equally as well in fire fighting and finance. Supervisor Sedovy noted that 60% of the Fire Company Funds are raised by themselves and only 1/3 is from the Town. He noted that they provide a dedicated service to the Town of Boston. A motion was made by Supervisor Sedovy and seconded by Justice Stromecki to approve the contracts with North Boston, Patchin and Boston Fire Companies for Fire Protection for the years 1973 - the sum of \$9,400.00, 1974 - the sum of \$9,800.00, 1975 - the sum of \$10,200.00.

Supervisor Sedovy stated that Sewer District #4 had been officially tabled until the next Town Board Meeting on January 3, 1973. The information submitted to the Town Board by Mr. Weller was turned over to the Town Attorney for study, and he was directed to report at the next meeting. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that he felt that all was probably in order and the Town would be able to take over Sewer District #4 at the January 3, 1973 meeting. The Town Clerk was directed to write a letter to the Town Engineer asking him to work up the inspection fees and inform the Town Board as to the amount. Supervisor Sedovy asked that the resolution which will be drawn up by Town Attorney Maxwell be flexible so blanks can be filled in, in regard to the recommendation to be made by Town Engineer Moncreiff on the one (1) year warranty on equipment. The Town Clerk was also directed to put in the letter that the Town Engineer should contact the Town Attorney in regard to setting up this resolution.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Transportation in regard to the rerouting of truck traffic on Route 219. The letter stated that the Town Board had received a letter in 1970 in regard to this rerouting and replied with no objections. The letter received from the State Department of Transportation dated February 27, 1970 was read, also a letter from the Planning Board to the Town Board recommending this rerouting was read and a letter dated May 21, 1970 from the Town Board to the Department of Transportation okaying this rerouting was read. Supervisor Sedovy noted that the latest letter from the Department of Transportation stated that only one accident involving a truck had occurred on new Route 219, but he felt that there was a potential hazard present and the Town Board should continue to try for this rerouting. A letter was read from the New York State Department of Transportation regarding drainage problems in the Northside and Meadow Drive area. Supervisor Sedovy noted that an answer to the Town Board's letters had now been received from both the County and State and both Departments felt they were in compliance and had no responsibility on private land. Supervisor Sedovy stated that there would be no help coming from the County and State and the people in the Northside and Meadow Drive area were in need of help. The Town Clerk was directed to send copies of the letters received to Charles Hughes and also a complete file of all correspondence to Matthew Sedziol. Both men have worked with the people in this area to correct the drainage problems. Supervisor Sedovy stated that it appears that the only answer to the drainage problem in this area is a Drainage District. The Town Clerk was directed to write to Mr. Hughes advising him that the Town Board would be glad to hold a Public Hearing to consider a Drainage District if this is what the residents in this area desire. The Clerk was also directed to contact Assemblyman Ronald Tills, State Senator Thomas McGowan and Congressman Jack Kemp to find out if State or Federal Aid is available for such a drainage District, and also to ask for advice as what the next step should be.
