Reports and Presentations:

Highway Superintendent Telaak reported on the following:

New trailer for hauling the new roller is at the dealer, hopefully will take delivery end of next week. New plow truck is at Valley fab getting equipped with plow and box. Guys in the shop have been working on the 2004 Oshkosh, rebuilding the sander box, probably saved the Town \$50,000 from buying a new box.

Brush pick-up is still going on. The guys have started down on the north end of town, coming up on Back Creek Road, Homestead, Old Orchard and they are continuing through the valley, long way to go but it's going well. Wood chips and fill available. Leaves need to be bagged, Highway will pick them up or can go out for garbage.

Rollover accident on Feddick Road, thankfully no one was killed, on a morning with a bit of snow and slush, poor condition of the County roads, a reason why the Town does not want to plow County roads. Price of fuel and gas is going up, diesel fuel has gone up, it will hurt our budget. Price of blacktop has gone up, a little less black top work for this year. Everything going well in Highway Department, doing ditching on Rockwood, Shero and Keller Roads, along with other roads, those are bigger projects for the summer.

Councilwoman Selby reported on the following:

Welcomed Father Jerry for being here tonight for the Invocation. Thanks to Jay Jackson for bringing some spiritual to the board meetings. We are tired of all this rain every month. We are really looking forward to a nice weekend and Happy Mother's Day to every Mom this weekend.

Councilman Cartechine reported on the following:

Thanked Father Jerry from St. John's for coming out tonight and Jay Jackson for carrying the torch to bring back the pleasantries that were once a part of this public role. Recognized the Parks Department, they have been hustling in getting our parks cleaned up, a lot of the work getting done to get our grounds ready for the spring and summer. The sporting leagues are starting and it's nice to see things green again. Attend the Fire Chiefs meeting with Supervisor Keding, great to get together with all the departments and talk about matters that are related to the fire service for the town. Shawn Crotty spoke at the meeting, he is a wealth of information, a local person in the community. Learned a lot about dispatch and some of the things that are getting overhauled in that department, really aimed at getting the quickest response time to the people in our community. Thanked the members of Boston Fire



Company for holding the meeting. Sportsman's Raffle for the Boston Fire Company this coming Saturday. Thanked the Town Clerk's office for all that they do for the Memorial Day Service and the Fourth of July Festivities. Both festivities are very special. The Town Band hopefully will be play at both events.

Councilwoman Martin reported on the following:

Conservation Advisory Council Annual Fishing Derby will be this Saturday, sure that fun will be had by all.

Town Clerk Quinlan reported on the following:

Fishing Derby is open to all youth fifteen and under, registration starts at 9:30 am, lunch will be provided, awards at 12:30 pm. ConnectLife Blood drive, record numbers, 32 units of blood collected, possibility of saving 96 lives. Sunday May 15th, Churchill Memorial, Curtis Cook organ recital, dedication of the new organ, all are welcome. Dog Control Officer report for April and the Annual Update Document for 2021 has been filed in the Town Clerk's office. Memorial Day Service plans are being worked on.

Supervisor Keding reported on the following:

Conservation Advisory Council will be working with the New York State Troopers to have a car seat safety check in the community, to take place behind the Boys & Girls Club parking lot, 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. If you have an expired car seat, one may be available at the safety check. There will be an event like this in the Fall with the Sheriff's. Information will be on Town website and social media.

A water test was done at the corner of Meadow and Boston State Road earlier this week. A flush test is a requirement that needs to be done when a waterline is installed, it is part of the process. The next phase, making the disconnect and reconnect to the new water lines. The contractor shall notify the Town and will notify the residents of any service interruptions. Please keep an eye on Facebook and the Town's website.

North Boston Park bid opening will be May 12, 2022 at 2:00 pm. Thanks to the Highway Department, they were able to demolish and take down the old structure. The Town received Community Development Block Grant Funds this year and we will see what kind of financial responsibility there is for that project officially and find which contractor we will be working with which will set up the timeline. We're hoping to

have that structure completed by Halloween or shortly thereafter depending on the contractor schedule.

Like Councilman Cartechine mentioned we were both at the Fire Chiefs meeting, always a great conversation.

The Young at Heart Group had invited me to their luncheon last Friday. I answered some questions regarding the County Roads. At the bottom of Rice Road there's still a slide that is over four years old. Hopefully we will get a timeline from Erie County Department of Public Works on that project.

A lot of the Town employees have completed the State mandated training.

Covid numbers are up. Some Emergency responders have tested positive, please be patient in response time, they can't go on any calls responsibly and legally if a responder is positive. We have Covid test kits and masks in my office and the Clerk's Office for anyone that would like them.

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ABOUT THE ERIE COUNTY WATER AUTHORITY

The ECWA was created in 1949 by a special act of the New York State Legislature to ensure that the people and the industry of Erie County would have a safe, plentiful supply of water for the future. Since 1953, the ECWA has produced and reliably delivered water of the highest quality to its customers at an affordable rate. As an independent public-benefit corporation, ECWA is not an agency of New York State and is totally independent of Erie County government. ECWA operates as a financially self-sustaining public utility and pays all its operating expenses from revenues generated by the sale of water to its over 500,000 customers.

To comply with State Regulations, ECWA, will be annually issuing a report describing the quality of your drinking water. The purpose of this report is to raise your understanding of drinking water and awareness of the need to protect our drinking water sources. Last year, your tap water met all New York State drinking water health standards. We are proud to report our system did not violate a maximum contaminant level or any other water quality standard. This report provides an overview of last year's water quality. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to state standards.

WHERE DOES OUR WATER COME FROM?

In general, the sources of drinking water, both tap and bottled, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals, and in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animal or human activities. Contaminants that may be present in source water include microbial contaminants, inorganic contaminants, pesticides and herbicides, organic contaminants, and radioactive contaminants. To ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the State and the EPA prescribe regulations which limit the number of certain contaminants in water provided by public systems. The State Department's and the FDA's regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Our source waters are Lake Erie and the Niagara River. The ECWA's Sturgeon Point Treatment Plant in the Town of Evans draws water from Lake Erie to supply the southern area of Erie County and some communities in Chautauqua and Cattaraugus Counties. The Van de Water Treatment Plant in the Town of Tonawanda draws water from the Niagara River and provides water to the customers of Monroe County Water Authority (MCWA) through an interconnection at the border to Genesee County. The MCWA operates in Genesee County, we do not directly serve any customers within Monroe County. These two plants serve more than 500,000 people in Western New York. The water is treated by conventional treatment and filtration and chlorine disinfection.

FACTS AND FIGURES

In 2021, the ECWA produced approximately 26.3 billion gallons of high-quality water for residential, commercial, and industrial use in 36 municipalities. The highest single day produced 94.93 million gallons. Some of this was unmetered water, 37.9%, use for flushing water mains, fighting fires, training firefighters, plant processes, equipment and hydrant testing and loss due to leaks. Approximately 16.3 billion gallons were sold to our customers. In 2021, residential water customers paid \$3.57/1000 gallons. The 2021 residential average customer bill was \$88.27 per quarter or \$353.08 for the year.

ARE THERE CONTAMINANTS IN OUR DRINKING WATER?

As the state regulations require, we routinely test your drinking water for numerous contaminants. These contaminants include total coliform, turbidity, inorganic compounds, nitrate, lead and copper, volatile organic compounds, total trihalomethanes, haloacetic acids, radiological and synthetic organic compounds. The table presented below depicts which compounds were detected in your drinking water. The state allows for us to test for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentration of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data, though representative, are more than one year old.

It should be noted that all drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. - 1 Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. We test it because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of our filtration system. State regulations require that turbidity must always be below 1 NTU in the combined filter effluent. The regulations require that 95% of the entry point turbidity samples collected have measurements below 0.3 NTU. Our highest single system turbidity measurement, 0.172 NTU, for the year occurred in May 2021
- 2 The level presented represents the 90th percentile of the 50 sites tested. A percentile is a value on a scale of 100 that indicates the percent of a distribution that is equal to or below it. The 90th percentile is equal to or greater than 90% of the copper values detected at your water system. In this case, 50 samples were collected at your water system and the 90th percentile value was the sixth highest sample at 36 ug/L. The second highest sample was the fourth highest with a value of 41 ug/L. The action level for copper was not exceeded at any of the sites tested.
- 3 The 90th percentile value was the sixth highest sample at 12.6 ug/L. The second highest sample was the fifth highest with a value of 13 ug/L. The action level for lead was exceeded at two of the sites tested, because samples were taken following a lead service line replacement.
- 4 This level represents the highest locational running annual average calculated from data collected.

Definitions and Abbreviations:

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL): The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG): The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contamination.

Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

<u>Treatment Technique (TT)</u>: A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Non-Detects (ND): Laboratory analysis indicates that the constituent is not present.

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU): A measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity more than 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Milligrams per liter (mg/l): Corresponds to one part of liquid in one million parts of liquid (parts per million - ppm).

Micrograms per liter (ug/l): Corresponds to one part of liquid in one billion parts of liquid (parts per billion - ppb).

Nanograms per liter (ng/l): Corresponds to one part of liquid in one trillion parts of liquid (parts per trillion - ppt).

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L): A measure of the radioactivity in water.

WHAT DOES THIS INFORMATION MEAN?

As you can see by the table, our system had no violations. We have learned through our testing that some contaminants have been detected; however, these contaminants were detected below the level allowed by the State.

IS OUR WATER SYSTEM MEETING OTHER RULES THAT GOVERN OPERATIONS?

During 2021, our system was in compliance with applicable State drinking water operating, monitoring, and reporting requirements.

INFORMATION ON CRYPTOSPORIDIUM

Cryptosporidium is a microbial pathogen found in surface water and groundwater under the influence of surface water. Although filtration removes Cryptosporidium, the most used filtration methods cannot guarantee 100 percent removal. During 2017, as part of our routine sampling, 6 samples were collected from Lake Erie and the Niagara River and were analyzed for Cryptosporidium oocysts. Of these samples, none were positive for Cryptosporidium. Ingestion of Cryptosporidium may cause cryptosporidiosis, a gastrointestinal infection. Symptoms of infection include nausea, diarrhea, and abdominal cramps. Most healthy individuals can overcome disease within a few weeks. However, immuno-compromised people are at greater risk of developing life-threatening illness. We encourage immuno-compromised individuals to consult their health care provider regarding appropriate precautions to take to avoid infection. Cryptosporidium must be ingested to cause disease, and it may be spread through means other than drinking water.

INFORMATION ON GIARDIA

Giardia is a microbial pathogen present in varying concentrations in many surface waters and groundwater under the influence of surface water. Giardia is removed/inactivated through a combination of filtration and disinfection or by disinfection. During 2017, as part of our routine sampling, six samples were collected and analyzed for Giardia cysts. Of these samples, two were confirmed positive. Therefore, our testing indicates the presence of Giardia in our source water. Current test methods do not allow us to determine if the organisms are dead or if they are capable of causing disease. Ingestion of Giardia may cause giardiasis, an intestinal illness. People exposed to Giardia may experience mild or severe diarrhea, or in some instances no symptoms at all. Fever is rarely present. Occasionally, some individuals will have chronic diarrhea over several weeks or a month, with significant weight loss. Giardiasis can be treated with anti-parasitic medication. Individuals with weakened immune systems should consult with their health care providers about what steps would best reduce their risks of becoming infected with Giardiasis. Individuals who think that they may have been exposed to Giardiasis should contact their health care providers immediately. The Giardia parasite is passed in the feces of an infected person or animal and may contaminate water or food. Person to person transmission may also occur in day care centers or other settings where hand washing practices are poor.

INFORMATION ON RADON

Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas found in soil and outdoor air that may also be found in drinking water and indoor air. Some people exposed to elevated radon levels over many years in drinking water may have an increased risk of getting cancer. The main risk is lung cancer from radon entering indoor air from soil under homes.

In 2019, we collected a sample from each water treatment plant that were analyzed for radon. The results showed no detection of the radiological parameters. For additional information call your state radon program (1-800-458-1158) or call EPA's Radon Hotline (1-800-SOS-Radon).

DO I NEED TO TAKE SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS?

Although our drinking water met or exceeded state and federal regulations, some people may be more vulnerable to disease causing microorganisms or pathogens in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice from their health care provider about their drinking water. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium*, *Giardia* and other microbial pathogens are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).



INFORMATION ON FLUORIDE ADDITION

Our system is one of the many drinking water systems in New York State that provides drinking water with a controlled, low level of fluoride for consumer dental health protection. According to the United States Centers for Disease Control, fluoride is very effective in preventing cavities when present in drinking water at a properly controlled level. To ensure that the fluoride supplement in your water provides optimal dental protection, we monitor fluoride levels daily to make sure fluoride is maintained at a target level of 0.7 mg/L. During 2021, monitoring showed that fluoride levels in your water were within 0.2 mg/l of the target level for 99% of the time.

New York State Department of Health Source Water Assessment

The New York State Department of Health completed a draft Source Water Assessment of the supply's raw water sources under the state's Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP). The purpose of this program is to compile, organize, and evaluate information regarding possible and actual threats to the quality of public water supply (PWS) sources. It is important to note that source water assessment reports estimate the potential for untreated drinking water sources to be impacted by contamination. These reports do not address the safety or quality of treated finished potable tap water. The Great Lakes' watershed is exceptionally large and too big for a detailed evaluation in the SWAP. General drinking water concerns for public water supplies, which use these sources include storm generated turbidity, wastewater, toxic sediments, shipping related spills, and problems associated with exotic species (e.g., zebra mussels – intake clogging and taste and odor problems). The SWAP is based on the analysis of the contaminant inventory compiled for the drainage areas deemed most likely to impact drinking water quality at this public water supply's raw water intakes. Separate assessments were completed for the Lake Erie source and the Niagara River source. The assessment found a moderate susceptibility to contamination for the Lake Erie source. The amount of agricultural land in the assessment area results in elevated potential of disinfection byproduct precursors and pesticides contamination. While there are some facilities present, permitted discharges do not likely represent an important threat to source water quality based on their density in the assessment area. There is also noteworthy contamination susceptibility associated with other discrete contaminant sources, and these facility types include: landfills. The assessment found an elevated susceptibility to contamination for the Niagara River source. The amount of agricultural (and to a lesser extent residential) lands in the assessment area results in elevated potentia

SEQRA REVIEW FOR MONACO POLE BARN ON SOUTH ABBOT ROAD

WHEREAS, Kevin Monaco of Monaco Garden Center has submitted a site plan dated January 31, 2022 together with supporting materials for a proposed new 12,000 square foot pole barn on South Abbot Road in Boston, New York; and

WHEREAS, after this project was reviewed and recommended for approval by the Planning Board, the Town of Boston has reviewed the environmental impact of the proposed project at its May 18, 2022 meeting; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has duly considered the site plan for the project and supporting documents, the Short Environmental Assessment Form, the criteria for determining significance set forth in 6 N.Y.C.R.R. § 617.7(c) of the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), the memorandum of Sarah desJardins, Planning Consultant, and such other information deemed appropriate; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has identified the relevant areas of environmental concern, has taken a hard look at these areas, and has made a reasoned elaboration of the basis for its determination; and

WHEREAS, the proposed action is classified as Unlisted with respect to SEQRA; and

WHEREAS, Unlisted actions are subject to environmental review under SEQRA; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Boston is the only involved or interested agency with regard to SEQRA; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board may determine act as Lead Agency with respect to the environmental review of the project as it has final authority to approve or disapprove site plans; and

WHEREAS, there are no other involved agencies, so the environmental review can be uncoordinated; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board hereby has determined that the project will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT





Unfortunately, Mr. Stringfellow is not present. Mr. Liegl talked to Ms. Dejardins/Planning Board Consultant and she talked to Dr. Ziarnowski and Dr. Ziarnowski was ok with it.

Mr. Monaco - talked about Mr. Stringfellow wanting the area cleaned up and do some landscape so it wasn't just looking at buildings. Mr. Monaco submitted a proposal to do something but the dilemma is the county ditch and how it is a mess. Cannot access until the county cleans it up. Mr. Liegl asked: What was the objective? RESPONSE: Mr. Jackson advised that the idea was that Monaco Enterprises has a plan and that there needs to be something in place. The difficulty is the County ditch. It does not make sense to plant trees with the way it looks now.

Mr. Stisser commented on how the board members did not have the site plan which showed the trees. This was now provided. Talked about how Mr. Stringfellow didn't want a garage type building without something in place. The site plan was to have shrubbery and trees in place and the other issue with the County ditch. Mr. Monaco confirmed that he cannot touch the ditch – County to handle.

Mr. Monaco talked about the debri, etc. and tried to pick away at it.

Mr. Stisser talked about moving the building back but this cannot be done because more soil would be needed and there is an easement for the Power Authority. Mr. Stringfellow is not present to see the site plans.

Mr. Jackson talked about a diagram with the parking lot and it didn't have the full plot plan. Mr. Monaco commented about the diagram and what it looked like.

Mr. Liegl asked about the last meeting and it seemed like Ms. Dejardins and Attorney Costello went back and forth. Ms. Dejardins recommended to approve the project with the contingent of the landscaping. Attorney Costello said we could not. Question: If this gets approved tonight, how long until the landscaping? Mr. Monaco said he can do the side of the property now but not the island, about 2 months. Mr. Jackson commented about where the building would go, did a drive by, and the unclean ditch by the County and how it looks. It does what it is supposed to do.

Mr. Stisser asked about the islands and that they go inside the parking lot? RESPONSE: Yes. To finish the parking lot, everything needs to go to the ditch. Mr. Stisser asked: Everything goes to the road? RESPONSE: Yes. Mr. Stisser talked more about the parking lot and Mr. Monaco talked about how he would have to clean up the County debri. Mr. Stisser asked about the green space between the island and to the road. RESPONSE: Mr. Monaco did not know. Mr. Monaco talked more about the green space. Mr. Stisser asked Mr. Monaco if he was approved, would he maintain. RESPONSE: Yes, once the County does the initial clean up. Mr. Stisser asked about the parking lot location. Mr. Monaco responded with referencing the diagram provided to the board members. Mr. Monaco not sure if he should be cleaning the ditch. Mr. Stisser asking more about the parking lot and talked about the distance: 104 ft from the edge of the road. Chapter 123. ZONING

Article XXV. Supplemental Lot Size and Open Space Requirements

§ 123-136. Limitations on obstructions in required open space.

A. In C or M Districts: No storage, truck parking, loading or unloading or processing of any kind shall be permitted in any required yard in any C or M District. This provision shall not apply to uses accessory to a permitted dwelling, but such accessory uses shall be subject to the following limitations on obstructions in required open spaces in R Districts.

B. In R Districts:

- (1) Accessory buildings and roofed projections shall not occupy more than 25% of the actual rear yard. [Amended 7-16-1997 by L.L. No. 5-1997; 2-4-2004 by L.L. No. 3-2004]
- (2) No part of an accessory building shall be nearer than three feet to a rear lot line or 10 feet to a side lot line.
- (3) Detached accessory buildings shall be at least 10 feet from any dwelling and five feet from any other building.
- (4) Maximum allowable height and square footage of lot coverage, for one-and-one-half-story accessory buildings is as follows: [Added 2-4-2004 by L.L. No. 3-2004]


