January 3, 1979

Town Hall
7:30 P.M.

Present were Councilman Milton Wittmeyer, Councilman James Smolinski, Councilman Esther Faulring, Town Attorney Charles Maxwell and Highway Superintendent Clarence Kreitzbender.

The meeting was called to order by Deputy Supervisor Jean Kleis.

A letter of resignation from Councilman David Zimmerman effective midnight January 3, 1979 was read. A motion was made by Councilman Smolinski and seconded by Councilman Faulring appointing David Zimmerman as Supervisor. Term to expire December 31, 1979.

three (3) ayes Carried

Supervisor Zimmerman was sworn in by Town Clerk Klein.

A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Councilman Smolinski that the minutes of the December 27, 1978 Special Meeting be approved.

four (4) ayes Carried

A motion was made by Councilman Smolinski and seconded by Councilman Wittmeyer that the Town Clerk's Monthly Report be accepted.

A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Councilman Smolinski that the General Fund, Special District and Capital Fund Bills in the amount of \$14,944.12 be paid.

A motion was made by Supervisor Zimmerman and seconded by Councilman Faulring that the Highway Bills in the amount of \$9,592.27 be paid.

A letter relative to the Association of Town's Meeting to be held in New York City from February 18th to February 21st, 1979 was read. A motion was made by Supervisor Zimmerman and seconded by Councilman Faulring that Councilman Wittmeyer be appointed the delegate for the Town of Boston at the Association of Town's Meeting.

Letters were read from County Legislator Bennett advising the Board of action taken at the December 5th and December 21st meetings of the Erie County Legislature. The letters were received and filed.

A letter was received from the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation advising of the following changes in Street Lighting for the Town of Boston Light District #1.

These changes were authorized in a Town Board resolution dated September 6, 1978. The letter was received and filed.

A petition signed by fourteen (14) residents of the Boston Hill Mobile Home Park advising the Town Board of inadequate water pressure was received. Supervisor Zimmerman directed that a copy of this petition be sent to the owner of the Trailer Park and that the Building Inspector be directed to check how the service goes into the park.

Mr. Emil Kemp, Lot 31, Boston Hill Park, stated that two rows of trailers in the park are not getting water pressure and three rows are. He advised the Board that he had contacted the Erie County Water Authority and had been advised that they could do nothing. Mr. Kemp stated he had also contacted the Erie County Health Department and they had taken pressure tests. Mr. Kemp asked the Board to send him a copy of the letter being sent to the Trailer Park owner.

Mr. Kemp also advised the Board that there is no garbage pickup at the Trailer Park.

He stated that he had called Southtowns and was advised that the park owner had told them not to go into the Park. Jean Kleis stated that a call had been received at the Town Hall from a resident of Pfarner Road who stated that none of the garbage pickup companies would service their area. Town Attorney Maxwell stated he would send a letter to Southtowns asking them why they were not servicing the Pfarner Road area.

Councilman Smolinski stated that this met with the approval of the Traffic Safety Committee. A motion was made by Councilman Smolinski and seconded by Supervisor Zimmerman authorizing the Highway Superintendent to purchase and erect 35 MPH signs on Meadow Drive following the approval of the New York State Department of Transportation.

Following discussion by the Town Board, Town Attorney Maxwell stated he would send a telegram to Lee Joyce and Sons, Inc., Holland, New York requesting immediate action and if none is taken further legal action will then be put into motion.

A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Supervisor Zimmerman reappointing Ditmar Bock, Harold Dodge and Paul Bolt as members of the Conservation Advisory Council. Terms to expire December 15, 1981. Councilman Wittmeyer stated they would be screening people to fill the other vacancies on the Board.

Mr. Emil Kemp, Lot 31, Boston Hills Trailer Park asked the Town Board what would happen to the Security Deposit put up by residents of the Trailer Park when it was sold. Town Attorney Maxwell advised Mr. Kemp that the Town Board has no jurisdiction as this is strictly private business.

Town Clerk Klein advised the Board that he had received an application and check in the amount of \$1,600.00 from Oscar Smukler owner of the Boston Hills Mobile Homes Park for his Trailer Park License. Town Clerk Klein further reported to the Board that he had also received an answer to his letter to Mr. Smukler relative to the water pressure problem, that his engineer and the Erie County Water Authority were working on the problem. A copy of a report by the Erie County Health Department was received. 



In the Governor's letter, a program was mentioned which would provide \$5.0 Million in financial incentives and rewards for local cost cutting efforts. Supervisor Zimmerman stated he did not know how this would benefit us as our tax was 50¢ per thousand. Assemblyman Kennedy advised in his letter that he had sponsored legislation to restore O & M funding for Sewer Districts to 33 1/3% and had co-sponsored with Senator Volker legislation to reduce County expenditures relating to the Mental Hygiene Law.

A notice was received from National Fuel Gas announcing rate filing and providing rate information.

A letter was read from Congressman Henry Nowak acknowledging the Town's letter relative to the Route 219 Expressway. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was received from Assemblyman Kennedy advising that his Seminar will be held in Albany on May 20, 1979 to May 22, 1979. The letter was received and filed.

Karen Kline asked if anyone would be attending the seminar and Supervisor Zimmerman stated that someone would probably be going.

Supervisor Zimmerman reported that as of this date no answer has been received from the owner of the Boston Hills Mobile Home Park or the Erie County Health Department relative to the Town's letters asking for the status of the water pressure problem. A letter was read from Planning Board member Donald Genzel thanking the Board for the opportunity to attend the Association of Town's Meeting in New York City. The letter was received and filed.







Supervisor Zimmerman directed the Town Clerk to send a letter to Assemblyman Kennedy and State Senator Volker backing the resolution approved by the Erie County Legislature asking the State to draft and enact legislation to include members of a bonafide Volunteer Emergency Squad in coverage for State death and disability benefits similar to those benefits afforded to Volunteer Firemen as our Emergency Squad is not connected to any fire company.

Another letter was read from County Legislator Bennett advising the Board of action taken at the April 5th session of the Legislature. Supervisor Zimmerman directed the Town Clerk to contact Police Chief Strack relative to the "Major Crimes Squad" as outlined in Mr. Bennett's letter, to get his ideas and comments on the idea. The letter was received and filed.

An invitation to attend an Open House for the new Emergency Squad Facility on Sunday, April 29, 1979 at 2:00 P. M. was received. Supervisor Zimmerman stated the dedication would take place at 2:30 P. M. The invitation was received and filed.

A letter was read from Stimm-Fitzpatrick, contractor on Section III of the Southern Expressway, advising that Rice Hill Road will be closed between West Hill Drive and Zimmerman Road for an extended period of time.

Another letter was read from Stimm-Fitzpatrick advising the Town Board of a double shift work schedule from June to October. The letters were received and filed.

Letters were received from Governor Carey's office, Assemblyman James L. Emery, and Senator John J. Marchi in reply to a Town Board letter of March 15, 1979 opposing the proposed change in the formula for the distribution of State Revenue Sharing Funds. The letters were received and filed.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Transportation advising the Board of the establishment of a 35 MPH speed restriction on Meadow Drive as requested by the Town Board in an order dated February 26, 1979. Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender was directed to post the necessary signs and advise the Town Clerk when this is done so he can advise the State of the completion date.

A list of the officers and committees for 1979 was received from the North Boston Volunteer Fire Company.

Mr. Al Stang, Feddick Road, commented on the dumping site on Feddick Road in Boston which was listed in a Buffalo paper recently. He stated that he had called the Erie County Health Department and had been advised that Mr. Schrieber had gotten a permit to dump from the County. Supervisor Zimmerman stated that he had not been aware of

any dumping site in that area and was as surprised as anyone when he read about it. Mr. Stang stated that the Town had been very cooperative when he came in Monday morning to discuss this matter. He further noted that he did not see how the County could do this without the knowledge of the Town. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that the Town of Boston now has a dumping ordinance, but prior to that there was no ordinance. Mr. Stang asked if the Town in the future would have any intention of creating a dump site on that particular piece of property. Supervisor Zimmerman stated probably not at this particular time, but could not say what could happen in the future as a major problem facing us now is what to do with garbage and it may come a time when we have to have our own dump, although it may not be in that spot. Mr. Stang was assured that before a dump was established Public Hearings would be held. Supervisor Zimmerman also pointed out that according to the number the dump had been given, it was unlikely any toxic waste was dumped there.

A copy of a letter from Town Attorney Maxwell to Oscar Smukler, co owner of the Boston Hills Mobile Home Park was read requesting Mr. Smukler to attend tonight's meeting. Town Clerk Klein stated he had not heard from Mr. Smukler. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that he had talked to Mr. Peter Kosowski of the Erie County Health Department and on April 21st, at 12 Noon, he is going to make pressure tests on the water line at the Trailer Court and if the pressure is not at a minimum pressure a summons will be issued returnable in the Boston Court. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that pressure tests have been made, but not at peak times so he felt that on a Saturday at noon should be a peak time.

She further noted that Mr. Smukler had been directed to do something about this problem by Mr. Chase a co owner. Miss Milks reported that the septic system works very well with no problem.

He stated that this would be accomplished by upgrading an existing road or creating a new road. Mr. Warren Moritz asked if the people on Zimmerman Road would have access to the interchange. Mr. Tocke stated yes and pointed out on the map where they would ingress and egress.

Paul Bolt asked about the proposed funding and Mr. Tocke stated that they would be going for discretionary funds from the Federal Government and do not feel that there will be any problems.

Mrs. John Koza asked Mr. Tocke if there would ever be a Brown Hill interchange, and Mr. Tocke stated that this area was one to be looked at as an alternative and it was possible that the Rice Road interchange could be moved.

Mr. John Koza asked if it was decided that there would be an area that was cheaper, would this be looked at. Mr. Tocke stated yes the cost factor would be considered.

Karen Kline asked if the primary concern was to have the interchange at the top of the hill to carry traffic to the valley. Mr. Tocke stated what we are talking about is an interchange at the top of the hill in the vicinity of Rice Road area and build a new or rebuild an existing road that will handle the traffic to bring it down to the valley.

Mr. Thomas Momberger asked if he understood that the ramp on and off the expressway would not be built until 1982. Mr. Tocke stated yes this was true, pointing out the different steps that would have to be taken before the actual construction began.

A letter and amendment to the Erie County Water Authority Rules for the sale of Water and the collection of Rents and Charges was received from the Erie County Water Authority. Supervisor Zimmerman stated that the new rate schedule would be on file in the Town Clerk's office for anyone interested.

Karen Kline asked if this was the first year that the taxpayers of Boston are being asked to pay for fire services instead of the Fire Companies going door to door for funds. The Supervisor stated yes and Karen asked then why did the fire companies need so much more money. Supervisor Zimmerman stated that fire services had always been paid but this is the first year they have done away with the Fund Drive. Mr. Edward Snow, a Boston fireman, stated that they did not receive sufficient funds as they had to keep replacing fire equipment. He noted that fund drives were done away with as they did not like to beg for money. He noted that Bingo is a help, but still does not meet all the financial needs. He also pointed out that the fund drive was not equitable as those with the most might give \$5.00 and a poor widow give \$10.00.

Mr. Tom Kyle, North Boston Fireman, stated that North Boston had lost money by not having a fund drive. He pointed out that inflation had driven the cost of equipment up by 50%. He stated that they did not plan on running a lot of gambling, but if they did have an occasion they would like to do it legally.

Mr. Edward Snow pointed out that by maintaining good fire companies the cost of Fire Insurance will not go up.

Councilman Wittmeyer pointed out that the fire company contract is renegotiated every three years and last year it was agreed to pick up the additional sum if the fire companies would not go house to house any more. He noted that in two more years it will again be opened up and they will obviously be asked for more money. He further stated that they have to raise some money on their own.

James Carr, North Boston Chief, stated that if they were against money for the fire companies they should see what a paid fire company would cost.

Mr. Walter DeForrest stated that he felt they were doing a good job and deserve the fine equipment, but felt that gambling would also be inequitable as those that could ill afford to gamble would and they will suffer. He stated he felt funding could come from 50-50's or raffles. It was pointed out these were illegal.

Councilman Wohlhueter stated that there has been better enforcement in the last couple of years with the present dog warden, but with the extra money a newer car could be purchased and bigger quarters obtained so the Dog Ordinance could be enforced more.

Mr. Haag stated that maybe a copy of the dog ordinance should be given with each license. He stated he was not criticizing the dog warden as he does a good job and maybe people don't realize there is an ordinance.

Mrs. Kaminski asked if the raising of the Dog License Fees meant that there would be a full time dog warden. Supervisor Zimmerman stated the Board was leaning that way. Mrs. Kaminski asked how many hours he worked and his salary. Supervisor Zimmerman stated he did not have the hours, but they were in the Clerk's Office. The salary, it was pointed out, is \$2,400.00. Mrs. Kaminski stated that good dog owners will be penalized. Supervisor Zimmerman stated with the increased funds it might be possible to have two people so there will be greater coverage.

Town Clerk Klein explained the new dog licensing process.







A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Councilman Faulring that the minutes of the September 5, 1979 Regular Meeting be approved.

Carried

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation advising the Town Board that the Operation and Maintenance Aid Grant for 1978 for Sewer District #2 had been denied. Supervisor Zimmerman asked that this letter be referred to Reed Garver the Sewer Maintenance Man.

A letter was read from Mildred Dolce, Rice Road, advising the Board that she was moving and thanking those who had assisted her while she lived in Boston. Supervisor Zimmerman asked that a letter be sent to Mildred Dolce wishing her the best and also thanking her for serving on the Senior Citizens Council.

A letter was read from Legislator Ronald Bennett advising the Town Board of action taken at the September 6, 1979 session of the Erie County Legislature. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was received from Stimm-Fitzpatrick advising the Town Board that Polish Hill Road would be closed permanently. Supervisor Zimmerman stated that the appropriate agencies had been notified. The letter was received and filed.

Joseph Tocke, New York State Department of Transportation was present at the Town Board Meeting and talked to the Board and audience of the studies that are being undertaken to determine the best route from the expressway interchange to Route 219. Mr. Tocke listed the alternatives as follows noting that nothing is finalized: 1) existing Rice Road interchange and then using the existing roads without constructing any new roads to the valley. Improvements would be made on the existing roads. 2) Rice Road interchange and then use a combination of existing roads and a new alignment down to the valley using about 60% existing roads. 3) Brown Hill Road interchange and coming down Brown Hill. Mr. Tocke stated that a previous idea of all new road alignment to come to the Valley had been dropped. He further stated that the further alternative is to do nothing. Mr. Tocke pointed out that the preferred alternative is to use the Rice Road interchange to West Hill, Tillen and Pfarner and swing off Pfarner to a new location and connect at the intersection of the Boston Colden Road. He explained that the road would not be an expressway type road, but a good two lane road on the order of Omphalius Road. Mr. Tocke noted this road fit into the Boston Master Plan and would not be disruptive to the area. Following his presentation Mr. Tocke invited all those interested to join him downstairs where he and his staff would answer any questions and the plans of the route were posted for all to view.

Chris Callahan asked that measures be taken to correct the intersection at the Southern Expressway and Route 219 as it is poorly marked. Councilman Smolinski advised Mrs. Callahan that this matter would be discussed under Councilman.

A letter was received from Good Shepherd Lutheran Church requesting permission to use the North Boston Stadium on Sunday, September 23. Supervisor Zimmerman advised that as the stadium was not owned by the Town they could not grant permission, but stated he felt they could use it. It was also pointed out that the Town Park could be used as there was no football game that day. The Town Clerk was directed to send a letter advising of this.

A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Councilman Wohlhueter to approve the issuance of a building permit to Pearl M. Emerling for a 50' x 60' x 14' building.

A motion was made by Supervisor Zimmerman and seconded by Councilman Wittmeyer setting October 3, 1979, at 7:45 P. M. to hold a Public Hearing on the use of Federal Revenue Sharing money.

Councilman Faulring advised the Board that a meeting would be held on Wednesday, September 26, 1979 at 8:30 P. M. at the Town Hall to discuss the Master Plan proposal for a road to be extended from Greenbriar Terrace to Smolinski Drive. This meeting is for all those interested in this matter.

A letter was received from the Erie County Water Authority with an attached list of amounts due for delinquent water bills. The Town Clerk and Town Attorney were directed by Supervisor Zimmerman to work together to send out the necessary notices to receive payment.

A motion was made by Supervisor Zimmerman and seconded by Councilman Wohlhueter to allow the Tax Collector Herbert Klein to use the night depository at Chase Manhattan Bank.

Highway Superintendent Kretzbender discussed the bids for Highway Salt, opened at the September 5th meeting, with the Town Board. Highway Superintendent Kretzbender advised that there is a shortage of salt and asked that the awarding of the bids be tabled so he can see what the state come up with on their bid and later on see what becomes available so he can buy it wherever he can. A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Supervisor Zimmerman to table the awarding of the contract for Highway Salt for the 1979-80 Winter Season as recommended by Highway Superintendent Kretzbender.

A letter was read from Town Attorney Charles Maxwell relative to a letter referred to him by the Town Board from West Seneca Developmental Disabilities Service Center. Supervisor Zimmerman stated that it had been looked into if there were any available sites that would meet the requirements as set forth in their letter of August 10, 1979, and no sites had been located so a letter was going to be sent to them to that effect, but today a letter had been received from Paul Bolt stating he might be interested in selling his property at 6610 Rice Road. Supervisor Zimmerman stated that he would meet with the Town Attorney on Thursday, September 20th to draft a letter to the West Seneca Developmental Disabilities Services.

Councilman Smolinski advised the Board that the traffic Safety Committee had received complaints relative to the detour at the Expressway and Chris Callahan and Councilman Wittmeyer pointed out the dangerous situation at the exit and entrance of the Expressway. Following a discussion, Town Clerk Klein was directed to send a letter to the New York State Department of Transportation with a copy of the letter to Assemblyman Kennedy requesting that possibly lights be put up to brighten the area thus making it easier to see the entrance and the exit of the Expressway. Also it was suggested that signs be put up to direct the traffic into the proper lane.

Councilman Wohlhueter advised the Board that he has received complaints of a bad portion of road on Heinrich near Valley Circle. Supervisor Zimmerman stated that he had talked to the County once on this and would contact them again.

Councilman Wittmeyer brought up the dangerous condition that exists at Route 219 and Abbott Road where a tractor trailer is parked. It was noted that when the trailer is pulled out of the driveway onto the road, it will be hazardous. Following a discussion by the Board, Town Clerk Klein was directed to write the New York State Department of Transportation and request that an investigation be made of this situation.

Town Clerk Klein reported that the Trash Pickup will begin on October 1, 1979.

The matter of the Paul Bolt apartment was discussed and Building Inspector Decker advised the Board that it is a three apartment residence. Town Attorney Maxwell advised the Board that as this appears to be in violation of the Zoning Ordinance, a letter should be sent to Mr. Bolt asking him to correct this and if he does not then the matter should be taken downtown and a Supreme Court Judge would make the ruling. He noted if he were brought into Town court the only recourse would be a fine and Supreme Court could issue a Restraining Order. A motion was made by Councilman Wohlhueter and seconded by Councilman Faulring directing Town Attorney Maxwell to send a letter to Mr. Bolt asking him to agree to correct the number of apartments in his home to conform to the Zoning Ordinance and if he will not then Town Attorney Maxwell is directed to take this matter to the Supreme Court for a ruling.





Supervisor Zimmerman pointed out that the Board has had knowledge of the route of the expressway for some time, but not the access road route as the Schwabel letter states. Supervisor Zimmerman asked that this letter be forwarded to the Department of Transportation.

A Public Notice was received from the New York Public Service Commission relative to rates, charges, rules and regulations of the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation for electric and gas service. The hearing will be held at the Erie County Library in Buffalo on October 23. Town Clerk Klein advised that the Notice will be posted on the bulletin board.

A copy of a petition of complaint in the matter of New York Telephone vs State Board of Equalization and Assessment was received. Town Clerk Klein stated it will be on file in his office for anyone interested.

An application for a permit to erect a Ham Radio Tower was received from David Tinkham, 7335 Hickory Drive. Supervisor Zimmerman asked that this application be referred to the Planning Board for their review.

At 7:45 P. M. a Public Hearing was held to receive written and/or oral comments from the citizens of Boston on the use of \$47,464.00 in Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and \$817.83 in the Federal Revenue Sharing unexpended fund balance. The Legal Notice was read by the Town Clerk. Town Clerk Klein advised that he had sent a notice of the hearing to the Senior Citizens, but had received no response. 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Sewer delay smells of bureaucracy

Dear Jack:

Just finished a small piece for this week's paper about one of the projects tied to the Southtowns sewage treatment plant. I am outraged, ready to abandon all my hopes and aspirations, because I can no longer comprehend the reasoning of our government bureaucracy.

Briefly, the story is this: A project involving the construction of interceptors and trunk lines that would link parts of Boston, Orchard Park, Hamburg and Eden to the lakeshore treatment plant now being built is again headed for a public hearing in the Erie County Legislature. The project has been delayed for three years because the federal Environmental Protection Agency has insisted that 28 archaeological sites in the area, supposedly containing Indian artifacts, be cleared before the EPA

releases any funding. During that time the estimated cost of the construction has soared from \$10.3 million to \$21.9 million.

What this and neighboring communities accepted years ago as a responsible safeguard to clean up and preserve our environment now has turned into a fiscal nightmare. It is going to kill the very region we are trying to sustain. With this irresponsible government interference from the fat cats who have no conception of how difficult it is to come by even the inflated dollars, our Southtowns sewage system will be well in excess of \$100 million.

WHILE IT IS difficult to even comprehend those figures beyond the identity of numbers, it is obvious there is only one source. Even if the figure is \$100 million, the burden to area property owners directly would be \$12.5 million, obviously exceeding the ability of many people to pay.

How in God's name can a government that is supposed to be fiscally responsible justify this rationale? Particularly when the bureaucrats have permitted the costs to more than double by stupid regulations and loathsome delays which, you have expounded many times, are destroying our motivation and incentive, our sense of values.

I believe in preserving our historical artifacts. But that excuse for delay becomes sheer hypocrisy when one considers what government has permitted to happen to our environment.

The only sewer system that needs overhauling is the one in Washington. We can smell the stench all the way to southern Erie County.

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Southtowns Sewer Project

Boom or Bomb?

The massive and controversial Southtowns sewer project has been pushed as an innovative step toward cleaning Niagara's southern streams and lakes and criticized as a colossal and expensive boondoggle.

Handicraft has caused even some original opponents of the project to doubt its worth as residents prepare to hook up to the sewer network in mid-1980.

"I don't know how much the original estimates were," said Sen. Raymond F. Callaghan, the Lackawanna Democrat who has been a steadfast opponent of the project. "Every sewer bill they're getting shows an increase and the thing isn't even operational yet."

Benefits Cited

Proponents of the project point to several benefits the sewer network and its wastewater treatment plant will offer taxpayers: a four-fold increase in the ability to recycle wastes, a reduction of the possibility of overflows and the phasing out of 13 smaller plants judged to be substandard by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The new plant is expected to relieve sewer problems that have plagued the Southtowns area for many years, while allowing cleaner water to be discharged into Lake Erie.

The problem of overloaded sewers in recent years has led to several moratoriums on construction in the area, and the new plant is being counted on to resolve the problem.

force the requirements to slow down the rate increases.

Repeated construction delays largely caused by EPA regulations had increased the cost of the project from \$58.7 million to \$95.4 million. Projected annual sewer tax rates for Southtowns residents have climbed accordingly, from \$68 a year to \$112.

"We've suffered from inflation greater than we predicted," admits Charles J. Alessi, deputy commissioner of the County Department of Environment and Planning.

Since the Southtowns Sewer Agency was formed in 1974 to pull Southtowns communities into a regional authority, inflation has exceeded the 7 percent rate Alessi and others had been forecasting.

There were several other complications. A proposed line for part of the project to run through the city of Buffalo, doubling the cost of that line. A two-year delay resulted in a decision to build a larger line to a proposed service area in East Aurora. The state also reduced its contribution to the sewer agency for annual operating expenses for the plant and its sewers.

"Besides the federal and state rules changing, we've also had two energy crises since the project was first conceived," Alessi noted. "How could we have anticipated that someone was going to change the rules of the game once we got into it?"

Others have argued that the county should never have entered the game, despite the 86 percent federal funding and 12 1/2 percent state funding for the system.

Gallagher, a former county legislator, has maintained that the tax base in the Southtowns is too small to meet the project's construction and operating costs. He argues that the EPA should have been forced to prove the Woodlawn plant

was the most economical way to improve sewer service to the area.

An apparently frustrated Alessi said the EPA "would have been better off just giving the communities the money to build it themselves" rather than having the county float bonds for the project.

Others have said it would be cheaper to extend sewer lines through Buffalo to the city's new plant on Bird Island, thus eliminating operating costs at the Woodlawn plant now under construction. But Alessi said his study of the proposal showed that annual costs for using the Buffalo system would have been \$2.2 million, compared to about \$1.8 million with the Southtowns plant.

But L. J. Fallon, chairman of the Southtowns Sewer Agency, claimed the EPA "never allowed the project down our throats. Signs that time, I have worked, my split, whether the regional sewer plan was worth it."


Despite the soaring costs, Fallon, the Department Supervisor in Hamburg, asserted: "We really don't have a choice of 20-20 hindsight. We thought what we did was the best we could."

With the advantage of hindsight and a clear memory of his opposition to the project, Gallagher said, "It's a ripoff. It got out of hand because of the shortsightedness of our public officials who went along with it."

Fallon, however, defended State Comptroller Edward V. Regan, the former county executive who pushed the project for Orchard Park, Hamburg, Eden and Boston.

"We can't shrug off the cost increases," he said. "The state is dying and we were talking federal funds might not be available in the future. Government is well-known to be fallible, but I felt the time to solve our problems was immediately," he said.

line of the tower if it did come down, would be over his fathers property. He pointed out the location of electrical wires in relation to the tower and stated he did not know why it had to be located on that portion of the property and they would object strongly to the tower.

Mr. Tinkham stated that the law was stated at the Planning Board Meeting that a tower was permissible in that particular area. He stated the location of the tower was for technical reasons as well as being on the north side of the house because of the construction of the antenna which will be attached and he needs the full length of the property. He felt that this location was the least conspicuous. Mr. Tinkham advised that what he is trying to do is get the antennas that are there now off the roof and put them on the tower pointing out that he will have more room on the north end.

Town Attorney Maxwell stated that it is not permissible in an R1 or R2 Zoning but can be put on a special permit which allows a variation of the permitted use. He stated that a special permit was discretionary of the Town Board and the opinion of the Planning Board is only advisory and not binding on the Town Board.

Mr. Herold stated he was aware of that but could not see anything under Section 2 or 3 of R2 for a Special Permit. He noted that it was under Section 5, Agriculture, A1 and not R2. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that Special Permit Applications can be made for any minor variation of the use requirements of the Zoning Ordinance. He stated there is a Section on Ham Radios under A1, but that does not preclude Special Permit Applications in other sections.

Supervisor Zimmerman stated that someone could come in and ask for a Special Use on any piece of property and we would or would not issue the permit. Mr. Herold stated if the tower is located on the north side of the property guy wires will have to be used to hold the structure up and they will have to come in four directions, and he did not see how this could be done without going on neighboring property. He noted that these towers have been known to fall and there is no reason why this has to be put where it will endanger adjacent property.

Mr. Tinkham stated this tower is not a monster as some people think, it is a small tower 40 to 60 feet and is not high for a tower. He stated that the manufacturer's specs say that guy wires are not needed as it is about 18" triangular and also to protect Mr. Herolds property it can be guyed from Mr. Tinkham's roof.

Supervisor Zimmerman asked if this tower would cause any problems with TV reception. He stated no more than now as he has had the antennas on the roof for 17 years. Councilman Wittmeyer asked Mr. Tinkham if he felt he would be helping himself by going from the roof to the tower. He stated yes and was also trying to neaten the property by taking them off the roof. Councilman Wittmeyer asked if the proposed location was the only place the tower could be located. He stated it was best as it is too conspicuous behind the house and the south side is near the septic system. Mr. Tinkham stated that he would like to make the tower about 60' so he would not have to go back and add on later.

Harold Klein asked if there would be problems with TV reception and Mr. Tinkham stated if there was no problem now then the tower will not be a problem. Mr. Val Bazilla also questioned TV reception and Mr. Tinkham stated the FCC is who you talk to if there are problems.

Councilman Wittmeyer stated he is not ready to vote on this question as he would like time to talk to TV people. Councilman Smolinski asked why the tower had to be 60' and Mr. Tinkham stated he wanted to get as much height as possible as he is going to the trouble of putting it up. Councilman Smolinski asked if he didn't feel the additional 20' would cause a problem with securing.

Councilman Wohlhueter stated he felt that serious questions have arisen and he would like to see the matter tabled for further study. He also felt that restrictions should be put on if a permit was given.

A motion was made by Councilman Smolinski and seconded by Councilman Wohlhueter to close the public hearing.





TOWN OF BOSTON
GENERAL AMBULANCE SERVICE CONTRACT
FOR
AMBULANCE SERVICE WITH BOSTON EMERGENCY SQUAD, INC.

THIS AGREEMENT made this 28th day of December, 1979, between the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, hereinafter designated as "party of the first part" and the Boston Emergency Squad, Inc., a New York membership corporation of Boston, New York, hereinafter designated as "party of the second part".

W I T N E S S E T H :

WHEREAS, prior hereto private ambulance and first aid service previously furnished to the residents of the Town of Boston was discontinued, and thereafter the Boston Emergency Squad, Inc., a membership corporation was formed and personnel trained to furnish said ambulance service to the residents of the Town of Boston; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Boston, through the said Town Board, party of the first part, duly authorized a contract with the party of the second part, for furnishing of general ambulance service and first aid to persons within the boundaries of the Town of Boston upon the terms and provisions herein set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, the party of the first part does hereby engage the party of the second part for the year 1980, from January 1, 1980 to December 31, 1980, to furnish general ambulance service and first aid to sick or injured persons found within the boundaries of the Town of Boston, pursuant to the provisions of Sections 122 and 122-b of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York, in manner following, to wit:

1. The Boston Emergency Squad, Inc. party of the second part, shall at all times during the period of this agreement, be subject to call for the providing and furnishing of general ambulance service and first aid assistance for the purpose of transporting sick or injured persons found within the boundaries of the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York to a hospital, sanitarium or other place for the treatment of such illness or injury as such person may require.

2. Said party of the second part shall respond and attend upon such sick or injured persons as soon as practicable, without delay, with available trained personnel and equipment, and shall proceed diligently in every way reasonably calculated to assist and transport said sick or injured person found within the boundaries of the municipality to a hospital, sanitarium or other place for the treatment of such illness or injury.

3. The said party of the second part further agrees to adequately supply sufficiently trained and experienced personnel for the services required as set forth in Paragraph "1" herein.

4. This contract is entered into between the parties pursuant to the provisions of Sections 122 and 122-b of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York, and all terms, provisions and conditions of said statute are herein incorporated by reference as though fully stated in this agreement.

5. In consideration for the furnishing of general ambulance service and first aid assistance, as herein specified, the party of the first part shall pay and the party of the second part shall receive the annual sum of \$7,075.00 per year, and the party of the first part covenants and agrees to pay the said annual sum to the party of the second part on or before April 1st in each contract year.

6. The Town of Boston, party of the first part, further agrees to furnish to the party of the second part, without charge, a proper and adequate ambulance motor vehicle or vehicles, adequately equipped, for the exclusive operation and use of the party of the second part in carrying out the terms and conditions of this agreement. The said party of the first part further agrees, without charge, to furnish an adequate structure or garage for the storage of said vehicle and equipment while same is in custody of the party of the second part and further the Town Board assumes the cost of utilities of said structure.

7. The Town of Boston, party of the first part, further agrees to defray the expense of and to pay the cost of insurance indemnifying against liability for the operation of said ambulance and equipment incidental to the furnishing of such ambulance service, and any premium or premiums for compensation of the members and personnel of the party of the second part for medical expense, loss of wages, compensation benefits or other claims arising by reason of the injury to or death of a member of the said Boston Emergency Squad, Inc., sustained while answering, attending upon or returning from any such call, or while engaged in any other volunteer duty within the terms of this agreement and, in case of the party of the second part shall be compelled or required to pay any such claim, the party of the first part shall reimburse the party of the second part the amount paid within thirty (30) days after the making of such payment.

The Town of Boston further agrees to effect and pay the expense of the following insurance for the benefit of the party of the second part and its members as follows:

- (a) Automobile Non ownership coverage to the extent of \$500,000.
- (b) Comprehensive General Liability Insurance including incidental malpractice coverage to the extent of \$500,000.
- (c) Fidelity Bond coverage of President and Treasurer of the party of the second part to the extent of \$5,000.
- (d) Medical Equipment Floater in the amount of \$5,000 subject to \$100 deductible.

8. The party of the second part agrees to furnish the Town Board of the Town of Boston a written itemized statement of its disbursements and expenses no later than September 10th of each year during the term of this agreement. It is further agreed by the party of the second part that no monies paid hereunder to the party of the second part shall be used for the purchase of radio equipment except upon the prior approval of the Town Board of the Town of Boston.

9. This agreement shall continue for a period of one (1) year from January 1, 1980 and from year to year thereafter unless either party shall determine to terminate this agreement by notifying the other party, in writing, before the 20th day of September, that it elects to terminate the contract on December 31st of that year; thereafter the contract may be amended or terminated and a new contract entered into in lieu thereof, pursuant to the procedural directives of the Town Law of the State of New York.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have duly executed and delivered this agreement the day and year mentioned.





EXPLANATIONS

- (1) Taxes for these services must be levied on the area of the town outside villages:

Building Inspection (Section 138, Town Law)

Board of Health (Section 304 Public Health Law)

Registrar of Vital Statistics, except when combined districts coincide with a consolidated health district (Section 4124, Public Health Law)

Library (certain contract payments)(Section 256, Education Law)

Zoning and Planning (Section 261, Town Law)

- (2) Taxes for these services must be levied on the area of the town outside villages under the circumstances set forth below:

Police Department (Section 150, Town Law)

Town of Fallsburg, and towns in Suffolk County containing villages which maintain police departments with two or more full-time policemen. Department established after January 1, 1960: Town contains a village which maintains a police department of four or more policemen on an annual full-time basis.

Department established prior to January 1, 1960: Amounts in accordance with an agreement made between the town and a village within the town which maintains a full-time police department of four or more policemen.

Joint Police Department (General Municipal Law, Section 121-a)

Recreation (Article 13, General Municipal Law)

Amounts for parks, playgrounds and recreation centers established under the provisions of Article 13 of the General Municipal Law.

Refuse and Garbage (Section 120-w, Gen.Mun.Law; Article 12, Town Law)

The share of the cost to be paid by the town in accordance with an agreement between the town and one or more villages for joint refuse and garbage collection and disposal, unless otherwise provided.

- (3) Revenues estimated to be received from any of the functions or activities for which taxes are levied in the town outside the village must be applied to the estimate of expenditures for such function or activity (Town Law, Section 107(2)).

Non-property tax distributed by a county must be credited to the town area outside of village if the village receives a cash distribution of non-property taxes from the county.
