A dispatcher at Fire Control recommended that this portion of the road be renamed "Old Lower East Hill Road" to minimize confusion when reporting an emergency. Mrs. David Galenski, E-7719 Lower East Hill Road, stated that the addition of the word "Old" prefixing the road name is fine with her, however, that the whole issue of the name change has become annoying as it has dragged on even after the Town Board reached a decision to retain the old name. A letter was read from Marilyn and Mark Pecyna, E-7741 Lower East Hill Road, in which they stated that they also feel the Town Board should not at this time change their decision, as the majority of residents spoke against a change. Supervisor Kennedy stated the addition of "Old" in front of the name should cause a minimal inconvenience, one that is not necessary to change on legal documents, but will facilitate emergency responses.

Mr. Falkides answered that he is still attempting to legally have the Sheriff auction off this trailer and that his attorney sent a letter to Town Attorney Maxwell two weeks ago regarding this matter. Jean Errington, 6183 Wildwood Drive, asked what the large metal object was that is in front of this abandoned trailer. Mr. Falkides said that is an old truck body that belongs to the same person who left the trailer. Mrs. Betts said that the abandoned trailer was not really the issue, that the eight addiitonal lots are the issue. She said it didn't seem right that they had to move a toolshed at considerable cost because it was 5 feet too close to their side lot line when they had no opposition to its placement from anyone on their street and Mr. Falkides can have such large lot variances granted. Supervisor Kennedy assured Mrs. Betts that any agreement that the Town Board makes with Mr. Falkides will be in writing and the residents of Wildwood Drive will receive copies of the conditions of this agreement.

WHEREAS, with the exception of the airport, the entire operation of the N.F.T.A. is not or never has been self supporting, but instead relies heavily on tax revenue in the form of subsidy from the federal, state and county governments for its daily operations, and

WHEREAS, the citizens of the Town of Boston contribute as much per capita to the N.F.T.A. as those presently being served and additionally have no other means of access to the county's mass transportation system, and

WHEREAS, ridership has in fact increased since this action was originally proposed in 1982, and

WHEREAS, we no longer wish to be relegated to the category of second class citizens when additonal internal reductions can be and should be effected within the N.F.T.A. without negative impact to the entire system, and

WHEREAS, this would enable the N.F.T.A. to reduce expenditures without curtailing services and the resulting hardship this action will create.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Boston join together with the communities of Angola, Alden and Holland in imploring the N.F.T.A. to reconsider this proposal and preserve this vital transportation service to our suburban communities.

Supervisor Kennedy said that the Town Board met with John and Katherine Falkides to discuss the concerns they and nearby property owners have with the request to expand the Mobile Home Park and that approval of the expansion is subject to execution of agreement by Mr. and Mrs. Falkides of certain conditions that must be met in this expansion. He asked for any comments on this action and Wanda Betts, 6184 Wildwood Drive, said she thought that being given an opportunity to state an opinion was unnecessary as it seemed pretty cut and dried that the application for expansion was approved. She stated the residents of Wildwood Drive are against it for several reasons - there are no restrictions on the type of trailers, the requirement for trees dosen't help the view from the Wildwood side and the abandoned trailer is still parked on the property. Deputy Town Attorney Perley said that legally the trailer can not be removed from the property and Supervisor Kennedy said one of the conditions is that the trailer be towed to the rear of the property, along with the truck parts, until it is sold at public auction. Mr. Kennedy also said that he feels that with the requirements Mr. Falkides will be subject to, the park will be better looking aesthetically than it is now. Jean Errington, 6183 Wildwood Drive, asked why Mr. Falkides could move the trailer now, when he wouldn't move it before. Councilman Faulring asked Mrs. Betts if the trailer park was there when she bought her property on Wildwood. Mrs. Betts said that whether she was there first or the trailer park was there first was not the point, the point being that Wildwood Drive residents would also like their voices heard. She also said that there have been years of problems with the park and there is always problems getting Mr. Falkides to rectify them. Mrs. Errington said a concern of hers is if these are safe lots. Councilman Wittmeyer said that it will be better than it is now and will be neater and cleaner and that this expansion will complete the development. Councilman Wohlhueter said he knows some of the residents and the owner of the subdivision but feels that with the conditions required of Mr. Falkides it will improve the looks of the park. Councilman Wittmeyer stated that he also lives close to the park and does not feel the expansion will devalue his property.

On February 10, 1986, the Traffic Safety Committee met and arrived at a conclusion to submit a recommendation to the County of Erie, Department of Public Works, Division of Highways, regarding relocation of the 40 MPH speed zone sign two tenths (.02) of a mile south of its present location in the vicinity of 8500 Boston State Road.

This recommendation is based upon agreement amongst the committee members, and it is strongly believed to be in the best interest of the people within the Town of Boston whom they represent. After much study and discussion the conclusion was, due to numerous environmental changes which have taken place over the past decade, and the resulting change in the modes of conduct within the zoned area, the extension of the speed zone south is justifiable. Several changes which have influenced our decision can be noted, namely:

- 1. The new Town Hall, and it's multiple public uses.
- 2. Baseball diamonds, six (6) behind the Town Hall
- 3. State Police Barracks built just south of the existing 40 MPH zone (approximately 50 man station.)
- 4. Boston Emergency Squad, next to Town Hall
- 5. Boston Lions Club Pavilion, next to Emergency Squad
- 6. Several sub-divisions within the area have expanded.
- Civic activities such as Octoberfest, Historical Society sales, Senior Citizens functions, Little League Boston Emergency Squad events, etc., have increased
 Two restaurants north of the Town Hall
- It is hoped that this will be submitted as requested, and not to ask for too much, but even the north end of the aforementioned area could be extended if the County Engineer found it feasible.

The undersigned, JOHN P. FALKIDES and KATHERINE H. These plantings shall be between five (5) and six (6) feet in height measured from the ground level, no more than eight (8) feet apart (trunk to trunk), providing an aesthetic setting, a safety shield and a noise barrier for persons living in lots numbered 1 through 4. Trees shall be a variety of spruce, fir or balsam. No white pine, scotch pine or red pine shall be used. The applicants agree to replace any and all of these plantings which do not survive, one (1) full year from the date of planting. Applicant shall preserve existing trees to the extent possible.

3. The applicants shall remove to Lot #8 the repossessed trailer and shed now situated on the property before commencing any work on the project and turn same so that it shall face perpendicular to the road right-of-way and shall proceed with the sheriff's sale expeditiously.

4. Mobile homes located on lots numbered 1 through 4 shall be set back from the rear lot line, running parallel to the State Road, a distance of at least twenty (20) feet. Letters were also read from Herbert Wehrfritz of Valley Truck & Equipment Co. and Stanley Wierzba of Alloy Welding & Fabricating, Inc. voicing objections and opposing the proposed removal of the bridge on Trevett Road. Supervisor Kennedy directed Town Clerk Carr to respond to Mr. Wehrfritz and Mr. Wierzba stating that the Town Board is also concerned about the effect the removal of the bridge would have on businesses on Trevett Road and that this matter is being referred to the Traffic Safety Committee for study before any reply is made to the Department of Transportation.

Supervisor Kennedy also said a meeting will be arranged with Joseph Tocke of the Department of Transportation regarding bridge construction within the town and directed the Town Clerk to once again write the County of Erie regarding the reconstruction of the Zimmerman Road bridge, which was scheduled to begin last year.

The County of Erie has not yet finalized the funding for the construction of the project and they noted that the timing may be such that the contract may not be let until early 1987 in order to avoid keeping the bridge closed over the winter season.

Kevin Quinn, 5796 Polish Hill Road, asked what action the Town Board has taken on the recommendation made by the Planning Board that the town hire an engineer to advise all agencies of the town on the environmental forms submitted by the developer on the proposed Highland Park Amphitheater. Supervisor Kennedy replied that additional information is needed from the developer before the town incurs expenses relating to this recommendation. Mr. Quinn asked what the cost would be to the town and Supervisor Kennedy said that a fee may be charged to the developer to help cover the costs of hiring an engineer after Lead Agency status has been obtained, the exact percentage of what costs may be recovered by the town is yet undetermined. Mr. Kennedy said that the developer has been asked to prepare studies on certain aspects of the project, such as noise and traffic and that a report on sound study has been received. He also stated that the Town Clerk has contacted the Supervisor of the Town of Hopewell, near Canandaguia, regarding a similar facility that was built there and operated by the County of Ontario for information on their programming, etc. He stated that the Town Board also has many concerns about specific issues, such as water, traffic, septic system, etc. and that an Environmental Impact Study will be required to address these issues. As far as advantages to the Town of Boston, it may be required that an admissions tax could be charged. Jim Fitzsimmons, 8773 Rockwood Road, asked how an application could be put down and the Supervisor said via a public hearing. He said that nothing has been done thus far that commits the Town Board one way or another and that although a Special Use Permit has been requested by the developer, legal counsel has advised that a rezoning will also be necessary, which also means a public hearing will be held on the rezoning application before a decision is made. Mr. Kennedy also stated that no one, either on the Planning Board or on the Town Board, has any financial interest whatsoever in this proposed amphitheater, despite the rumors. Thomas Momberger, 9000 Zimmerman Road, said this is not a local issue, but one that effects all perimeters of the town and it should have been stopped immediately when it was first proposed. He said he felt the Planning Board has blinders on and they should promote a residential community and not industry as Boston is known for its rural serenity and he is not pleased with the Planning Board's attitude toward the development of the west hill.

Received a letter from Calvin Reeve in answer to the Town Clerk's letter of June 23 regarding his subdivision of parcels of land within the Town of Boston. Mr. Reeve stated that all the parcels he has subdivided have been more than 5.2 acres in area and have complied with all New York State and Erie County regulations. Town Clerk Carr said she also received a telephone call from Eva Buczek, who said that she has met the requirements of the subdivision ordinance, as she has only sold four parcels of land.

Received an Application of Consent to Assignment of Assets from International Cable to International Cablevision, Inc.

Received notification from the North Boston Volunteer Fire Company of membership changes within their organization.

Supervisor Kennedy received notification of an upcoming Fire Chiefs Seminar to be held in Depew regarding new OSHA regulations. He requested that Councilman Wittmeyer forward copies of this letter to the three fire companies and asked that a Town Board member also attend this seminar.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Transportation stating that the Town of Boston will continue to receive funds under the CHIPS program during 1986 and that new legislation has authorized a one-time payment of \$1,688 on March 25, 1987.

RESOLUTION - RECONSTRUCTION OF COUNTY ROADS IN THE TOWN OF BOSTON

Town Hall 7:30 P.M. Thomas Momberger, 9000 Zimmerman Road, asked if the Town Board would accept questions regarding the proposed amphitheater. Supervisor Kennedy stated he planned on giving a progress report later in the meeting, but would do so at this time. Mr. Kennedy reported that the engineering firm of Tallamy, Van Kuren, Gertis & Associates has been retained by the town to review the Draft Environmental Impact Statement, which is expected to be submitted by the developer within ten days, and make recommendations on Supervisor Kennedy also stated that the members of the Town Board it. travelled to Rochester, Michigan this past week to make an inspection of the Meadow Brook Amphitheater, a facility quite similar to the one proposed for Boston. He reported they were interested in how this facility handled traffic control, what the acoustical levels were, etc. He noted that there is a new residential development of \$150,000 - \$200,000 homes being built very nearby. He stated that the Town Board will probably travel to Canandaigua shortly to inspect this amphitheater and talk with the Supervisor there about problems they may have encountered. Mr. Momberger asked if the Michigan facility was on a school campus. Supervisor Kennedy said that it is built on lands owned by the university, however it is not right on the campus and in fact the residential area is closer than the college buildings. Mr. Momberger said he felt it is not comparable because it is part of the school campus, therefore in a different type area. Supervisor Kennedy said that when a public hearing date is set that notices will be sent to the Hamburg Sun, Suburban Press and Springville Journal, as well as organizations in town and a sign made for the sign board in front of the Town Hall. It is a possibility that the public hearing will be held at the Boston Valley School, in order to allow for more seating room. Mr. Momberger read a prepared statement from the coalition opposing the amphitheater and asked that it be made a part of the record.

At 8:00 P.M. a public hearing was held to consider the request of Nicholas and Debra Smith for a Special Use Permit for the operation of a business to offer horseback riding, riding lessons, hay rides, sleigh rides, boarding horses and a petting zoo on their property at 9920 Feddick Road. The legal notice was read by Town Clerk Carr, who also read a letter from the Planning Board, that recommended the granting of the Special Use Permit. Mrs. Carr noted that the Short Environmental Assessment Form had been completed, with a negative impact on the environment and that neighboring property owners have been notified of this hearing. Councilman Wittmeyer said he has concerns regarding the Smiths' contention that they can use the County Forest Park for bridle paths. Mrs. Smith said they have contacted the Commissioner of Parks for approval. Frank Lisowski, Deputy Commissioner of Parks, was present and stated that there has been no permission granted to date for this use of the park and that there are presently no bridle paths in the park. Supervisor Kennedy said that the Town of Boston has no jurisdiction over granting

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that portion of the request for hayrides and sleighrides on the roads, as this is part of the Vehicle and Traffic Law. Dorothy Ruchalski, who owns land on Feddick Road, said she had two concerns with this request: 1. Has the County of Erie given permission to use their lands, mainly because she, as a taxpayer, would not want to be liable for any lawsuits arising over an accident on county property; and 2. that the Smiths have allowed livestock to graze on the Ruchalski property, despite her requests to them to fence them in. Mrs. Smith stated that at this time they are requesting the Special Use Permit for only the 25 acres of land they own, as until the question of using the county park has been settled, they will only use their property for riding. Miss Ruchalski said that 25 acres is not enough land to even consider using, as one third of that acreage is used for pasture and a pond. Mrs. Smith said that there is no insurance company east of the Mississippi that will issue coverage for a riding stable and there is nothing they can do to obtain it. She also said they now have twenty horses and no ponies. There were no further questions or comments.

A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Supervisor Kennedy to close the Public Hearing at 8:25 P.M.

The Special Use Permit request of Nicholas and Debra Smith for the operation of a business to offer horseback riding, riding lessons, hay rides, sleigh rides, boarding horses and a petting zoo on their property at 9920 Feddick Road was tabled until the August meeting. A list of conditions will be drawn up under which the town would approve the Special Use Permit application and the Smiths are asked to document in writing the fact that insurance coverage for this operation is not available and also to secure permission from the Commissioner of County Parks for horseback riding within the County Forest Park.

Councilman Wittmeyer reported he visited the Meadow Brook Amphitheater in Rochester, Michigan over the July 4th weekend, prior to the Town Board's trip there this past week. He said he was there the day after an event was held and the grounds were immaculate and well kept. Mr. Momberger asked how much seating this facility has and Mr. Wittmeyer said there are 3000 fixed seats and over 4000 seating for the lawn. Veneard Neri, 8951 Zimmerman Road, said he is concerned that the only input into the amphitheater project has been from the applicant and he wondered if the property owners had to get an attorney to protect their interests. Supervisor Kennedy said that all data and reports that have been received thus far from the developer have been reviewed critically and will continue to be reviewed critically by not only the Town Board, but by the Department of Environmental Conservation, various other state and county agencies, and by any other person who wishes to review the reports that have been submitted to date. Councilman Wohlhueter said he has been reviewing all the studies done to date and is keeping the citizens of the town in mind while doing so and will represent the residents when making a final decision.

A letter was read from R. Mark Tress, Postmaster of Eden, requesting a Stop sign be installed on the west side of the intersection of Morningside Drive and East Lane, and outlining reasons he is requesting one. A letter was then read from Harry Strack, Jr. of the Traffic Safety Committee, stating they have checked this area and have determined that a stop sign would alleviate problems mentioned in Mr. Tress's letter.

A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Councilman Faulring to authorize Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender to install a Stop sign on the west side of the interesection of Morningside Drive and East Lane.

Received a copy of Ethics in Government and Elections Committe of Erie County, New York proposal from Robert F. Whelan, Comptroller of the City of Buffalo. Supervisor Kennedy stated that he feels the county government should make a determination in this matter, as it is their function, and the proposal will be on file in the Town Clerk's office.

A letter was received from the United States Department of the Interior, requesting geologic or hydrologic data which may have been collected within our town. Supervisor Kennedy directed Town Clerk Carr to reply that extensive studies were done in this area at the time of the Route 219 Expressway and sewer construction and that New York State Department of Transportation and the Erie County Sewer Authority will have the information they request.

A letter was read from John and Katherine Falkides stating they have a contract to purchase four acres of vacant land adjoining and contiguous to the lands of the Boston Hills Mobile Home Park, contingent on the approval of the Boston Town Board to allow the development of these premises into mobile home lots of 5000 square feet each. Supervisor Kennedy said that he is against approval of further variance requests for mobile home lots at this time and would prefer to wait for the new Zoning Ordinance, of which the proposed Mobile Home Park Ordinance will be a part of, to be adopted. He also directed the Town Clerk to send a copy of the proposed Mobile Home Park Ordinance which was drafted by the Planning Board several years ago back to the Planning Board at this time for their review and updating, if necessary, as there have been many member changes since the time it was originally drafted. Mr. Kennedy also told Mr. Falkides that this ordinance could be adopted separately and made a part of the new Zoning Ordinance at the time of its adoption. Mr. Falkides asked if this process could be speeded up and Mr. Kennedy stated it would be at least October before a public hearing would be held on the ordinance. Town Attorney Maxwell asked that Mr. Falkides submit a detailed survey with the proper dimensions of the proposed lots and all other data that would be requested of a subdivider before any action is taken on the request.

A letter was read from the North Boston Volunteer Fire Co., Inc. requesting that Hydrant C-56 be moved from its present location twenty feet off the Boston State Road to a new location of three or four feet from the highway. They also request that the senior citizen complex being constructed should have a 8 inch line, rather than the 6 inch line being planned for a new hydrant that will be installed in the complex. Supervisor Kennedy directed Councilman Wittmeyer to get an exact location where the hydrant should be placed and prices will then be obtained for the cost of moving the hydrant, as requested. He also said it is possible that an eight inch line could be installed to the hydrant at the senior citizens complex with funds to pay for it coming from Water District No. 1, rather than the developer of the project, as the building plans have been approved by the town already.

Supervisor Kennedy referred to the Planning Board the request of Frank G. Banko to rezone a parcel of property at the raar of 7170 Boston State Road from Agricultural A-1 to Business B-1 for the purpose of construction of a warehouse on the property of Kirst Construction, Inc. An area adjacent to the Eighteen Mile Creek that is in the Flood Plain will be excepted from the rezoning request.

RESOLUTION - STOP-DWI

A letter was read from the Boston Emergency Squad, recommending approval of Marjory Keiber to the position of full time dispatcher. A letter was also read from Mrs. Keiber requesting this appointment. Supervisor Kennedy asked that this matter be tabled as no information has been received regarding a resignation of a current dispatcher and he is planning on a meeting with Samuel Ware, President of the Emergency Squad, at which time he will ascertain the status of the current dispatchers.

A letter was read from Raymond D. Miller requesting a change in business use of the property at the triangle of Boston State Road and Abbott Road which is currently a used car lot, into a restaurant. Supervisor Kennedy stated that the area in question is properly zoned for a restaurant and directed the Town Clerk to write Mr. Miller and inform him that a building permit must be secured before remodeling work can begin and that all work must be in conformance with the New York State Building Code.

Supervisor's Monthly Financial Report was received.

Supervisor Kennedy read a letter received from Thomas Needell, 7123 Boston State Road, regarding the belt sander races that were held at Murphy's Tavern in 1985 and concerns that they will be held again this year. Mr. Needell asks that a public hearing be held prior to the granting of an approval for these races, should they be held again. The Parks Department will ascertain there is no damage to the town property.

Town Clerk Carr read a letter received this date from the New York State Department of Transportation, denying the request made by the Town Board for the establishment of a 40 mph zone from the newly established 40 mph speed zone 0.3+ mile north of Butternut Road to Patchin Road. 



THIS AGREEMENT, made this 17th day of December, 1986, between the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, hereinafter designated as "party of the first part" and the Boston Emergency Squad, Inc. a New York membership corporation of Boston, New York, hereinafter designated as "party of the second part."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, prior hereto private ambulance and first aid service previously furnished to the residents of the Town of Boston was discontinued, and thereafter the Boston Emergency Squad, Inc., a membership corporation, was formed and personnel trained to furnish said ambulance service to the residents of the Town of Boston; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Boston, through the said Town Board, party of the first part, duly authorized a contract with the party of the second part for furnishing of general ambulance service and first aid to persons within the boundaries of the Town of Boston upon the terms and provisions herein set forth;

NOW, THEREFORE, the party of the first part does hereby engage the party of the second part for the Year 1987, from January 1, 1987 to December 31, 1987, to furnish general ambulance service and first aid to sick or injured persons found within the boundaries of the Town of Boston, pursuant to the provisions of Sections 122 and 122-b of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York, in manner following, to wit:

1. The Boston Emergency Squad, Inc., party of the second part, shall at all times during the period of this agreement, be subject to call for the providing and furnishing of general ambulance service and first aid assistance for the purpose of transporting sick or injured persons found within the boundaries of the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, to a hospital, sanitarium or other place for the treatment of such illness or injury as such person may require.

2. Said party of the second part shall respond and attend upon such sick or injured persons as soon as practicable, without delay, with available trained personnel and equipment, and shall proceed diligently in every way reasonable calculated to assist and transport said sick or injured person found within the boundaries of the municipality to a hospital, sanitarium or other place for the treatment of such illness or injury.

3. The said party of the second part further agrees to adequately supply sufficiently trained and experienced personnel for the services required as setforth in Paragraph "1" herein. General ambulance service shall also include the furnishing of all radio, electronic and telephonic dispatching equipment and property trained voluntary dispatchers, as members of the Emergency Squad, together with any location or locations that may be necessary for the installation of said equipment and personnel, including the right of the Boston Emergency Squad, Inc. to lease said location or locations, as may be required and necessary to furnish full time dispatching services for said general ambulance services and first aid to be furnished by the terms of said agreement.

4. This contract is entered into between the parties pursuant to the provisions of Sections 122 and 122-b of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York, and all terms, provisions and conditions of said statute are herein incorporated by reference as though fully stated in this agreement.

5. In consideration for the furnishing of general ambulance service and first aid assistance, as herein specified, the party of the first part shall pay and the party of the second part shall receive the annual sum of \$23,500.00 per year, and the party of the first part covenants and agrees to pay the said annual sum to the party of the second part on or before April 1 in each contract year.

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6. In arriving at a determination of the annual payment for the furnishing of ambulance service, the Town of Boston shall consider as a proper expense any reimbursement paid to a member of the Emergency Squad for wage or economic loss incurred in responding as a witness to a court subpoena resulting from his duties as a member of the Emergency Squad and any reasonable charges for outside legal advise in connection therewith upon prior approval of the Town Board.

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7. The Town of Boston, party of the first part, further agrees to furnish to the party of the second part, without charge, a proper and adequate ambulance motor vehicle or vehicles, adequately equipped, for the exclusive operation and use of the party of the second part in carrying out the terms and conditions of this agreement. The said party of the first part further agrees, without charge, to furnish adequate structure or garage for the storage of said vehicle and equipment while same is in custody of the party of the second part and further the Town Board assumes the cost of utilities of said structure.

8. The Town of Boston, party of the first part, further agrees to defray the expense of and to pay the cost of insurance indemifying against liability for the operation of said ambulance and equipment incidental to the furnishing of such ambulance service, and any premium or premiums for compensation of the members and personnel of the party of the second part for medical expense, loss of wages, compensation benefits or other claims arising by reason of the injury to or death of a member of the said Boston Emergency Squad, Inc. sustained while answering, attending upon or returning from any such call, or while engaged in any other volunteer duty within the terms of this agreement and, in case of the party of the second part, shall be compelled or required to pay any such claim, the party of the first part shall reimburse the party of the second part the amount paid within thirty (30) days after the making of such payment.

The Town of Boston further agrees to effect and pay the expense of the following insurance for the benefit of the party of the second part and its members, as follows:

- (a) Automobile non-ownership coverage to the extent of \$500,000.00.
- (b) Comprehensive General Liability insurance, including incidental malpractice coverage to the extent of \$500,000.00.
- (c) Fidelity Bond coverage of President and Treasurer of the party of the second part to the extent of \$5,000.00.
- (d) Medical Equipment Floater in the amount of \$5,000.00 subject to \$100.00 deductible.

9. The party of the second part agrees to furnish the Town Board of the Town of Boston a written itemized statement of its disbursements and expenses no later than September 10 of each year during the term of this agreement. It is further agreed by the party of the second part that no monies paid hereunder to the party of the second part shall be used for the purchase of radio equipment except upon prior approval of the Town Board of the Town of Boston.

10. This agreement shall continue for a period of one (1) year from January 1, 1987 and from year to year thereafter unless either party shall determine to terminate this agreement by notifying the other party, in writing, before the 20th day of September, that it elects to terminate the contract on December 31 of that year; thereafter the contract may be amended or terminated and a new contract entered into in lieu thereof, pursuant to the procedural directives of the Town Law of the State of New York.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have duly exercised and delivered this agreement the day and year mentioned.

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

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

EXPLANATIONS

(1) Taxes for these services must be levied on the area of the town outside villages:

Building Inspection (Section 138, Town Law)

Board of Health (Section 304 Public Health Law)

Registrar of Vital Statistics, except when combinded districts coincide with a consolidated health district (Section 4124, Public Health Law)

Library (certain contract payments) (Section 256, Education Law)

Zoning and Planning (Section 261, Town Law)

(2) Taxes for these services must be levied on the area of the town outside villages under the circumstances set forth below:

Police Department (Section 150, Town Law)

Town of Fallsburg, and towns in Suffolk County containing villages which maintain police departments with two or more full-time policemen. Department established after January 1, 1960: Town contains a village which maintains a police department of four or more policemen on an annual full-time basis.

Department established prior to January 1, 1960: Amounts in accordance with an agreement made between the town and a village within the town which maintains a full-time police department of four or more policemen.

Joint Police Department (General Municipal Law, Section 121-a)

Recreation (Article 13, General Municipal Law)

Amounts for parks, playgrounds and recreation centers established under the provisions of Article 13 of the General Municipal Law.

Refuse and Garbage (Section 120-w, Gen. Mun. Law; Article 12, Town Law)

The share of the cost to be paid by the town in accordance with an agreement between the town and one or more villages for joint refuse and garbage collection and disposal, unless otherwise provided.

(3) Revenues estimated to be received from any of the functions or activities for which taxes are levied in the town outside the village must be applied to the estimate of expenditures for such function or activity (Town Law, Section 107 (2)).

Non-property tax distributed by a county must be credited to the town area outside of village if the village receives a cash distribution of non-property taxes from the county.
